Eddie Shore Hockey Future Still Uncertain

DETROIT, Nov. (AP) —Frank Calder, president of the National Hockey League, said here tonight that he would take up the case of Eddie Shore, holdout star of Boston Bruins, when he returns to his office at Montreal tomorrow.

Earlier in the day Art Ross, manager of the Boston club, declared that Shore, one of the game's greatest stars and most valuable players in the league a year ago, was probably through with big league hockey forever because of his holdout strike.

"Shore failed to play with us at Toronto last Thursday night and he did not come to Detroit, so I would guess that he is suspended," Ross said.

"We offered Eddie everything within reason and when he would not accept terms we turned the whole matter over to Calder. So far as I am concerned, negotiations are through. If President Calder and Eddie can get together, it is O. K. with me."

Shore's place in the Boston lineup was taken by Jack Crawford, a rookie defenseman, as the Bruins walloped Detroit, 4-1.

Rugby Team Bases Play On Song System

(Canadian Press Despatch) GUELPH, Ont., Nov. 8 —If there is a boy in the family, preferably one who weighs 175 pounds and who likes football and music, send him to Ontario Agricultural College where they mix the two with the greatest success in their football teams.

The latest thing at O. A. C. is to base football on the popular and some not-so-popular, songs. This is what Coach Fred Baldwin has done with the 1938 edition of the Aggies, crowned champions of the western group of the Intermediate Intercollegiate Football Union for the fifth time in eight years Saturday.

The husky, red-weathered Aggies sing to the opposition and, so far, the opposition has been devastated. A lot of natural football ability goes with the crooners and that's a help too. Win or lose, these Baldwin Aggies are a great show.

"They play to rhythm," says Baldwin, "and they play to put on a show. To my mind at least 20 per cent of the people watching football don't know the finer points of the game and I think it's up to us—the coaches—to give them a show."

The fans are amazed when Aggies wheel out of huddles in merry-go-round formation. What they can't hear is the team singing: "The Merry-Go-Round Broke Down—oompah, oompah, oompah—and it made the greatest sound."

Eldwin doesn't mind admitting that besides serving as a good show, it helps distract the opposition's attention from the ball and before they come to they're liable to find a speedy Aggie back behind their secondary and off or a touch-down. On both plays Aggies are trained to move on certain words.

Named Champion Of Angler's Club
JASPER, Alta., Nov. 8 —Elmer G. Ecklund, 2231 Ulysses St., N. E., Minneapolis, is the champion speckled trout fisherman of the Maligne River Anglers Club for the year 1938.

This announcement has just been made by Robert Sommer, manager of Jasper Park Lodge, under whose auspices the competition has been held for many years. With the announcement goes the gold button of the club, emblematic of the season's championship. Rumerup position was captured by Jerome M. Schweitzer, 730 5th Avenue New York, and with this award goes the silver button.

The competition this year was the keenest in the history of the club and entries came from all parts of the United States and Canada. The territory of the Maligne River Anglers Club is that portion of the Maligne River between the source of Medicine Lake and the outlet into Medicine Lake and most of the way this is what is known as "fast waters." All fish entered must be weighed on tested scales and measured. They must be caught on artificial fly single hook, with a red weighing not more than six ounces. The winner, Ecklund, speckled trout weighed 2 pounds 6 ounces with a length of 16 1/4 inches. He used a jungle cock wet fly.

Install New Type Of Airport Light
VANCOUVER, Nov. 8 —First of its kind in Canada, a new system of contact lighting is being installed for night flying at Sea Island airport here.

The contact or flush lights, which resemble corner buttons at some road intersections, are set in concrete along the extreme edges of the runways. They throw a bright circle of light on the runway which the pilot sees when approaching the field as a motorist sees a row of street lamps when approaching a valley from a hill.

No light goes straight up, the top of the fixture being protected by a metal plate. Thick holophane glass sides, about two inches high, permit the light to spread out on the surface of the runway. The lights show from the air as white circles about 30 feet in diameter. The fixtures are strong enough to permit the heaviest airplane to taxi over them without slightest damage.

Sam Sneed, Canadian open champion and home course favorite, was headed with Henry Picard of Hershey, Pa., at 68.
