**Veteran's Loans Act Proclaimed**

OTTAWA, Jan. 14 (CP)—The Veterans Business and Professional Loans Act, passed at the last session of Parliament as a measure to encourage financial assistance to veterans at low rates of interest, will be proclaimed tomorrow, Veterans Minister Mackenzie announced tonight.

Proclamation of the act was withheld while regulations for administering it were re-drafted, the Minister said. This task now has been completed in co-operation with the Department of Finance and the chartered banks of Canada.

The loans under the act will be available to veterans who have received war service gratuities but have not already been given assistance under the Veterans Land Act. The veterans may apply for the loan for the following purposes:

1. For purchase of a business or partnership.
2. Purchase or repair of machinery, tools, instruments or other equipment of business.
3. Construction, repair or alteration of, or making of additions to, any building or structure used to be used in the carrying on of business.
4. Any purpose as prescribed which may be deemed to benefit the veterans' business.

Loans will be made for varying purposes, depending on the size of the loan and the individual circumstances of the borrower. The maximum term will be 10 years and the rate of interest five per cent. The act defines business as including trade, industry or profession.

The banks themselves will be guaranteed by the Government against loss up to 25 per cent of the overall aggregate amount of loans up to \$1,000,000 and 15 per cent thereafter. The normal lending procedure but the act permits the banks to take additional lending security.

Loans made within five years are guaranteed under the act.

In explaining the act the Minister said its purpose was to encourage banks to provide additional funds at a comparatively low rate of interest to assist veterans to establish themselves in businesses or professions.

**Junior Commerce Chamber Celebration**

MONTREAL, Jan. 14 (CP)—Twenty thousand members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Canada in 141 Canadian communities will begin this week the celebration of Canadian "Joyce" week, a seven-day period during which special emphasis is placed on the national aspect of the organization's work.

Announcing plans for the week from Jan. 15 to 22, national headquarters of the Junior Chamber said the top project for this year is a drive to encourage the study of government and civic affairs in Canada.

The many veterans who have joined the Junior Chamber since leaving the services are welcoming the opportunity to know more about the Government and about the many perplexing problems that confront the national economy, an announcement from national headquarters said.

Rate of national importance is a national traffic safety campaign being planned for April. Through the Campaign members of the Junior Chamber will strive to reduce the toll of lives and injured through traffic accidents by organizing a public campaign in all Canadian towns and cities.
