The Seat Of Authority

they have intuitively perceived of the things of God, are great authorities in religion. The Christian consciousness of the Church when it is pure and earnest for the same reason is a safe religious guide.

The Bible for the same reason will occupy a still higher place: not merely because, as we believe, Jesus was divine whose words it contains, but even from the humanitarian point of view because Jesus had the truest reverence, the largest faculty of faith, the richest spiritual consciousness of any teacher the Church has ever had.

"The Bible is the religion of Protestants." We give it the first place among religious authorities; but why do we accept it as being or containing the "word of God?" It is not because the Church commands us so to believe. It is not because the Bible makes the claim to be inspired. It is because the word of God within our own hearts bears witness to the Word of God in the Bible. This is no new doctrine, although it is being revived in modern days. It was the teaching of St. Paul: "The word of God is not far from thee, for thou sayest that thou art a Christian; and he saith that he is a Christian, who will go up to him and bring it down to us. It is not buried in the depths of the Bible, that we should send critics and exegetes to dig it up for us; but the Word of God is in our mouth and in our heart." It is a principle which was clearly recognized by the Westminster Divines two and a half centuries ago, when they said in the Confession of Faith: "Our full persuasion and assurance of the infallible truth and divine authority of Scripture is from the inward work of the Holy Spirit, bearing witness by and with the word in our hearts." God's voice within us testifies to God's voice in the Bible. The Bible, therefore, needs no defense at the hands of men. It needs no argument in favour of its divine authority.

It is not that every healthy-minded man its own evidence that it came from God. He that is of the truth will perceive its truth. He that is of God will hear God's word in Holy Scripture. If a man can see no beauty in the Bible, nothing to inspire and uplift and ennoble his life, he needs no argument; but spiritual eyesight. His unbelief does not shake our faith in the Bible; but merely reveals his own lack of religious capacity. If a man cannot see the sun in the heavens, you need not argue with him; he needs an oculist to open his eyes. If a man cannot discern colours, he needs not argument but colour education. If a man cannot distinguish between "Old Hundred" and "God Save the King," there is no proof you can offer him; he needs musical education. So in religion, you cannot prove to a man what he does not see. He who scoffs at the Bible—who fails to catch its spirit and its thought—its power to quicken faith and hope and love—will ask us in vain for any argument as proof that Holy Scripture contains the Word of God. If a man can read the Bible and his heart not respond to the faith of Abraham, the patience of Moses, the enterprise of Joshua, the self-denial of Samuel, the penitence of David, the love of Jesus, the heroism of Paul; if this book does not inspire and ennoble him, he needs little logic, eyesight not argument.

There is great need at the present day that we should get down to and take our stand upon this "Bed Rock of religious belief." And I fear that many of us have not sufficient reason to give for our belief in the Scriptures as the inspired Word of God. We set it up as the final seat of authority in religion; and why do we so believe it? Men give all sorts of bad reasons in this age of controversy and criticism for believing in the Bible; but we really believe in it because the Word of God within it witnesses to the Word of God in our hearts. We believe the Bible because the Bible declares its own inspiration. We believe the Bible because the Bible declares its own truth. We believe the Bible because the Bible declares its own existence; but we believe in the Bible because we are conscious of God and hear his voice in Holy Scripture. We do not believe in the Bible because the Bible teaches it; but we believe in the Bible because its teaching of immortality is confirmed by the witness of our immortal nature. We do not believe in Christ because the Bible contains his teaching; but we believe in the Bible because the Christ as the hope of glory—the Inward Light which lighteth our souls—witnesseth to the Christ of the Gospel story. We do not believe in human duty because the Bible teaches it; but we believe in the Bible because its revelation of duty agrees with the deliverance of our own moral consciousness. This is the bed-rock of religious belief—our Christian consciousness. This is the ultimate seat of religious authority—God who dwells within us. This was the test to which the Books of the Bible were originally brought. Various pieces of religious literature were scattered among

Russell, who indicated that both men probably would be rewarded with promotion to permanent rank. The attempted hold-up was planned some weeks ago, it is believed. The three men learned that Zebrowski was in the habit of carrying largesums of money belonging to the loan association. Zebrowski is survived by his second wife, four children by his first marriage and by four step-children. Rendered unconscious when shot, he was taken to the Bayonne hospital, where he died soon afterward. He was one of the most respected members of the foreign community in Bayonne and was trusted with the life savings of many of his friends. Bober, in his statement to the police, declared that Zebrowski was fearless in the face of imminent danger. Kowalski, he said, thrust his hand in Zebrowski's coat pocket and Zebrowski gripped the arm. The bandit pulled and squirmed, and, according to Bober, unable to break the hold finally drew his pistol and fired.

The churches. These were gathered together—and tested by the Church. Those which did not appeal to the Christian consciousness of the Church were rejected. Those which the Church accepted as useful religious aids were placed in the Canon of the New Testament. This is one of the outstanding principles of the Reformation. Martin Luther called the Epistle of St. James a right strong epistle and denied its right to a place in the Bible. Men are clamoring loudly for the inspiration of the Bible; but we do well to remember that the inspiration of the Bible-Reader is just as necessary as the inspiration of the Bible-Writer. The Holy Spirit within us bears witness to the teaching of the Holy Spirit in the Book. If we take our stand upon the inspired Christian Consciousness, then we shall remain unshaken amid the storms of criticism. But if we pin our faith to any external authority—even to an inspired Book—when any new discovery is made, or any new theory advanced, which seems to threaten the trustworthiness of the Book, we are panic-stricken, and the cry goes up: "They have taken away my bible and with it my God, my Christ, my Immortality." To a deeper faith—a more sure and steadfast authority—I summon you today—to the Eternal verities of religion—the permanent truths of the Christian consciousness. Theology will change; but religion will come and go; but the Word of God will remain, attested by the abiding facts of the religious consciousness. The Word of God is in our hearts, and one jot or tittle of that Word shall never pass away.
