The Sybil was used for this run last winter and has been running to the Magdalen Islands all summer. Captain R. Burns being in command. B. L. Woodside was recently elected President of the Prince Edward Island Club of Seattle to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Capt. Alex. MacDonald. Dr. A. F. Cooper, of Arcata, Humboldt county, Calif., was a visitor to the Bug Club during the Portola celebration, and called at The Maple Leaf office. Dr. Cooper is a son of W. Cooper, a native of Grand River East, Lot 46, P. E. Island. His mother's maiden name was Miss Lydia Conahan of the same place, a sister of Mrs. Henry Jenkins of San Francisco. When the discovery of gold in California was heralded to the world, and people from every corner of the globe were flocking to the Golden West, Dr. Cooper's grandfather built a vessel near his old home on the Island, and together with his wife and family sailed around Cape Horn in 1849, landed in San Francisco the same year, and later settled in Humboldt county. There three of his sons were killed by the Indians—two in 1852 and one in 1861—the doctor's father alone escaping. A few years later the old pioneer returned to the Island, and for some years was Speaker of the local Legislature. Dr. Cooper, who is a graduate of the medical department of the University of California, accompanied his mother on a trip to her old home last year, and enjoyed a delightful visit among relatives he had never seen before, he being a native of the Golden West.
