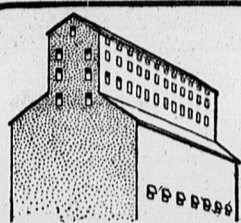

TRAIN WRECKERS INSANE.

OTTAWA, August 4—Dr. Fontaine of Hull, has conducted an examination into the sanity of Louis Richard, who is confined in the jail there awaiting his trial on the charge of attempting to wreck the C. P. R. Gatineau Valley train on July 26, by placing obstructions on the rails, and was reported the man as insane. Nothing can be ascertained as to his family affairs beyond that he used to live at Quebec. He will be kept under observation at the Hull jail for another week until an order can be obtained for his committal to an insane asylum near Montreal.

INCREASED ITS DIVIDEND TO FOUR PER CENT.

MONTREAL, Aug 6—The annual meeting of the shareholders of the New Brunswick Railway Company was held in the company's office, Lake of the Woods Milling Co, building, today.

The directors' report was considered satisfactory and a dividend of four per cent. on the capital stock of the company for the year ended June 30, 1910, was declared payable on Aug 15. This is an increase of one per cent.

STRIKING.

C. S. Nesbitt, of Durand, an employee of the Grand Trunk who sacrificed his expectation of a pension of \$50 per month from the Company, by joining the strikers three weeks before the pension was due is not to be congratulated for his heroism. He was hardly fit to exercise his own discretion in flinging away an income that would have stood between them and want as long as he lived. The frequent drags him into strikes would keep a debtor and a creditor account of his losses by obeying the union and his profits out of strikes even when they succeed, he would be astonished how the balance would show on the wrong side. In Nesbitt's case, the whole account may be on the wrong side. He is too old for any other employment than switching, and if the strike does not succeed, which is more than likely, he will be permanently out of job. Footish Nesbitt.—Detroit Free Press. 8-8dr11.
