Assistant Priest at St. Peters Cathedral

THE REV. F. DOUGLAS HENDERSON

(St. Peter's Cathedral Monthly.) The incumbent was requested by the warden of the prison, Rev. F. Douglas Henderson, rector of St. Peter's, offering him the post of Assistant Priest at the St. Peter's Cathedral with the special duty of working with the young people. It was made clear at the time that we had no desire to rob Port Hill of an energetic and devoted Parish priest and that Mr. Henderson would not be expected to come to us until the needs of Port Hill could be met. At the same time Mr. Henderson had received the Bishop's permission to seek work among young people, especially boys' work. Mr. Henderson replied: "accepting our offer subject to the Bishop's permission. This has now been granted and we may expect Mr. Henderson to start his work here on October 15th. One thing which stands in the way is the obtaining of a suitable house for Mr. Henderson. We hope this difficulty will soon be overcome."

It is more than twenty-four years since St. Peter's Cathedral was first Assistant, though during the incumbency of Canon Simpson, it was our hope that with the coming of our Assistant Priest a new staff may be made of work for young people, including such as all admit is sadly needed. It is our purpose to start on this foundation work on a small scale, clearing up opportunities for young people out and on a job for young people only at St. Peter's, but for the whole island.

The Rev. F. D. Henderson was trained at King's College and has held courses at the University of St. Michael's, at both of which places his work has been most successful. He is a native of New Brunswick and is a true helpmate to him in all his undertakings. She is most interested in Young People's Work and in the W. A.

We ask the congregation to give to Mr. Henderson a hearty welcome and their hearty co-operation. We pray that their stay with us will be a happy one and that their work will be abundantly blessed.

Mr. Henderson will be succeeded at Port Hill by Rev. G. Proulx who was chaplain in the forces overseas and is a native of Newfoundland. He will take up his new duties October 15th.
