identification had to be adopted. An individual appeared who withdrew money from the account and signed a formal receipt in James Patterson's name. He had been recognized as "a Patterson" by the bank stenographer and had answered satisfactorily some questions of identification. Counsel argued that it was an unusual thing for a person to keep a bank-book in a trunk without looking at it for over a year, and with the key not in his immediate possession. The plaintiff had a brother at home for a considerable length of time who was something of a "sport" and who was not earning money while he was home. Plaintiff should have known something about the withdrawal of his money, which was made on eight occasions. The last withdrawal was \$700; then the brother disappeared. The question was, did the plaintiff know anything about the matter? Had he been negligent in looking after his money? He should have kept the book in a secure place where no person could lay hands on it. Had there been any collusion between the plaintiff and another party with a view to defrauding the bank? The case was a serious one, involving eight forgeries, the penalty for a forgery being sixteen years. The guilty person was therefore liable to imprisonment for life. The bank had already paid out the money in good faith. They did not pay it again because they wished a thorough investigation. The bank had extensive business in every part of the country and the detection of such a forgery was very important.

Mr. Bentley, K. C., for the plaintiff maintained that the actual deposit of the money was undisputed and that it was not withdrawn by the plaintiff or with his authority. He was entitled to a verdict by the jury. Counsel for the defense had insinuated a charge of criminal conspiracy on the part of plaintiff which was unwarranted by any evidence given. Would such an action be reasonable on the part of a young man, twenty-eight years of age, who for eighteen years had been saving his hard earned money and depositing it regularly in the bank? The plaintiff was satisfied that he had put his bank book in the locked trunk in his room on the occasion of his second last deposit, in August 1922, and he had no occasion to look at it until the following year. His attitude from the time he noticed the withdrawal of his money until the present had been that of an innocent man, and his evidence showed that on the last two occasions when money was withdrawn he had been working in the country. The bank promised a thorough investigation and plaintiff and his counsel had offered every information required. Finally after communicating with the head office the bank had written that they could not pay the money. The questions of negligence do not rest with plaintiff, but with the bank. Counsel emphasized the plaintiff's unblemished character. Counsel for the defense had tried to throw suspicion upon another member of the family who was absent and could not speak for himself. The plaintiff was justified in asking not only for the amount of money in the bank, but for damages for having his cheque refused when it was formally presented, and for the attempt to vilify the character of a member of his family. However, only the amount of the deposits, with interest, was actually asked for.

Adjournment was made until 10.30 a. m.

found pure and uncontaminated. The Sanitary Officer, Jas. Bradley, has done good work during the past year and has found considerable difficulty in dealing with unsanitary water closets, often in small and in connection with houses that are not fit to have sewerage installed.

We have had the usual number of complaints regarding pigs and will continue to have them together with the bad odor, so long as the by-law permitting them on our backs. This Council which has done so much for public health might make another advance and abolish the pig.

We have had some complaints about the city dump near Park St. This place is not suitable for dumping purposes, its close proximity to dwelling houses and especially to the P. D. I. Hospital should be enough to condemn it and an effort be made to procure a more suitable site outside the city limits.

The Free Dispensary has done its usual good work among the poor during the year and if it were not for this worthy institution more calls would have been made upon the City Council during the unusually severe winter of the past year. The Free Dispensary well merits the most generous support of the city.

The list of deaths from all causes showed 10 deaths from apoplexy, 18 from heart disease, 10 stillborn, 1 from unknown causes, 29 from pneumonia, 4 from paralysis, 2 from suicide, 7 from tuberculosis, 1 from tetanus, 1 from tuberculosis, 2 from diabetes, 1 from a pitheloma, 5 from influenza, 9 from myocarditis, 3 from measles, 10 from old age. Total comprised deaths in Charlottetown and Royal. Hospitals, Falconwood and Infirmary from January 1st to December 31st, 1923 the total deaths being 260.

In moving the adoption of the Health Officer's report, Coun. Yeo expressed his agreement with the report, and in favor of the removal of pigs within the city limits. The excellent water supply in Charlottetown should be a source of gratification to citizens, as shown by the careful analysis of Dr. Nichols, Coun. Pierce seconded the adoption of the report, and the motion being carried unanimously.

**HONOR TO CHARLOTTE-TOWN ABROAD.**—George C. Hennessey, a son of the late Michael Hennessey, who for sixteen years has been Superintendent of Chapel Car work for the Catholic Church Extension Society of the United States of America, has been honored by His Holiness, Pope Pius XI. in a signal way. Mr. Hennessey has been made a Knight of the Holy Sepulchre and given the decoration corresponding to the dignity. There are several notifiable orders of knighthood, one of which was given to Mr. Charles Dalton some years ago because of his benefactions to St. Dunstan's College and his interest in the care of tuberculosis patients. Mr. Hennessey's distinction comes to him for long service in an original form of missionary work in newly settled sections of the West and South of the United States. He has had three Chapel Cars under his charge and was always personally on one of them. The distinction was conferred immediately after Mr. Hennessey's withdrawal from the work to go to business in Portland, Oregon. He is now a member of the firm of McEntee, Hennessey & Cherry. The new Knight of the Holy Sepulchre has several brothers and sisters living in Charlottetown, who naturally will be delighted at this mark of appreciation from such a high source.

Labor representation has changed the whole aspect in the Commons in that it is no longer a rich men's club where a few occasionally dropped in to while away a few hours afternoons at least attend assiduously to their duties. Lansbury objects strenuously to the rule which makes necessary that members arrive at the House before ten o'clock so that they may claim their seats when they return in the afternoon and in summing up says he believes the entire legislative machinery should be overhauled and the buildings readjusted in order to accommodate the new methods of Labor.

The owner of the Herald further points out that members' salaries should begin when they are sworn in on the opening day of Parliament but he demands that the oath of allegiance should be taken as in the constitutions. This would mean that each man would receive thirty five pounds more than is the case today—a suggestion which will not likely be unfavorably received by the majority of labor members.

**JELLY FISH HOLD-UP**

DURBAN, S. A., Jan. 13.—The steamship Wentworth, a vessel of 5,200 odd tons, arrived recently in Algoa Bay after being delayed for sixteen hours by a jelly fish.

The Wentworth was about to leave Durban for Algoa Bay to load a cargo of maize, but when the machinery for circulating the water through the condensing plant started no water flowed.
