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## BOARD OF TRADE CONCLUDES WORK

Election of Officers. Hon George E. Hughes President.

HALIFAX, August 22.—President—Hon. G. E. Hughes, Charlottetown. 1st Vice-President—W. B. Snowball, Chatham. 2nd Vice-President—F. C. Whitman, Annapolis. Secretary-Treasurer—S. M. Creed, Halifax.

With the election of the above officers, an exhaustive review of the fishery question and a strong endorsement of Halifax as the port of the All-Red-Line, the final session of the Maritime Board of Trade was concluded last night.

MR. SUMNER'S CHARGE. At the morning session amid scenes meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade, in which the charge was made of confusion, never before seen at a meeting had been "packed." The resolution introduced by the Halifax Board to grant running rights over the Intercolonial to the C. P. R. was adopted. A motion that the vote be recorded was then put and lost whereupon F. A. Sumner, a delegate from Moncton arose and charged that fifteen or twenty men not accredited delegates had voted. This imputation was resented vigorously by the Halifax delegates, but amid demands that he apologize, Mr. Sumner reiterated his charges.

Excitement ran high for a time, calls for a proper vote being mingled with demands for a resumption of business. The Chairman ruled that as a majority of the delegates had voted against having the names recorded, it could not be done. This brought applause from one side and sarcastic remarks about "persons who were afraid to stand by their votes" on the other.

Finally a motion was made that the Chairman's riding be not sustained. President Bell decided that he called and delegates required to answer "yes" or "no" to their names. This was done and the Chairman's ruling was sustained.

A PROLONGED DISCUSSION.

For three hours yesterday the discussion waged and but for the five minute rule of speakers it would have prolonged indefinitely. Mr. R. Emmerson, H. J. Lovat, J. H. C. W. Robinson, Ex-President of New Brunswick, J. A. Johnson, Halifax, Prof. Andrews, Sackville, and G. E. Faulkner, President of the Halifax Board, were among those who participated. Two amendments were voted down and when the vote was taken at 11:20, it stood 52 for 24 against. It was then that Mr. Sumner made his charges.

## CRUSHED TO DEATH BY FATHER'S HORSE

Animal Fell On Little Girl and Fractured all Her Ribs.

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., Aug. 23.—A peculiar and very sad accident occurred at Milltown last evening. B. H. Kerr had returned from the field with a load of hay and was hoisting it to his loft by the aid of a horse. His little girl, three years old, had hold of the reins. As the horse moved out into the yard some of the gearing caught suddenly and the horse was jerked back with such force that it fell on the little one's head but death had been caused by the ribs protruding through the lungs. The parents are prostrated by the sudden blow.

## MOTHER STEWARD HAS PASSED AWAY

Noted Temperance Worker Dies at Her Home in Hicksville.

HICKSVILLE, O., Aug. 23.—Mrs. Eliza D. Stewart, the noted temperance advocate and known all over the country as "Mother" Stewart, died at her home here recently. Her body will be taken to Springfield, O., for burial.

"Mother" Stewart was 92 years old. She was born in Piquette, O. She devoted her life to the temperance cause and established the first W. C. T. U. in Ohio at Osborn in 1873.

In 1876 she carried the white ribbon to the sisterhood of England. The British Women's Temperance association was the result of her journey. Then, back to her native land where she took the W. C. T. U. into Virginia in 1878 and introduced the Blue Ribbon pledge work among the colored people there.

Later, in 1880, without salary and on money gathered by the sale of valuable goods, she took the white ribbon south and formed unions of both races. Her hand was the first to bridge the chasm that war had made.

From that time when her work for temperance began in public, down through the years to 1895, her labors continued. She was invited to be present at the world's W. C. T. U. convention held in London. The expense of the journey was met by Lady Somerset, president of the association that was formed when Mother Stewart went to England with the white ribbon.

Mother Stewart never fully gave up her public work until she was 90 years old. Since then her pen has been busily engaged until within the past two years. Her 92nd birthday was celebrated on April 25th.

Following the civil war she lectured extensively in the southern states on behalf of the war sufferers. Until five years ago she resided at Springfield, where she lectured in any temperance crusades. Scarcely a woman in America could boast of the praise from pulpit and press like "Mother" Stewart.

She was also a co-temperary with the late Francis E. Willard, the noted W.M.S. woman.

## ROCKEFELLER AND 15 CENT LUNCH

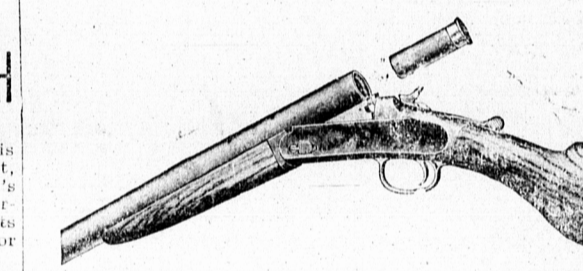
