## EXCITING HORSE RACES YESTERDAY

The Charlottetown Driving Club's fourth series of ice races were witnessed yesterday afternoon by a fairly large crowd. The ice course which was recently prepared was in very good condition and the racing was good, although perhaps, not quite as exciting as on previous occasions. The 2.23 class trot and pace was captured by Angus Dillard, after his losing the first heat to Moth Miller. The racing was excellent between these two; it was close and exciting and the heats were fast. Cherry Ripe, the favourite of last year whose record on ice has not yet been beaten, was not in form. A strong effort was made to win with Derby, but this horse seems to have gone back from his form at last year; he could not get better than third. The Dixie Girl was given an easy race by Mr. Henderson. The 2.30 trot and pace was won by Alfred K., owned by Mr. W. F. H. Montgomery, of Bedeque. This is the third successive win for Alfred. He lost the first heat to Frank I.; the second heat he won by a very narrow margin from the same horse; while the third and fourth heats he won quite easily, the last particularly by quite a large margin, Frank I. going to breaks. Queen Alto was not in shape, having injured herself in the last race. These three trotters when right make a splendid combination, although Alfred seems by a shade to be the best. Commodore Grant started in the first heat and raced fast until about half-way down, when he broke, his owner claiming that this was due to shouting. On this account he withdrew the horse from the race.

## FILLIPINOS GAVE A GREAT WELCOME.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Progress toward civilization in the Philippine Islands has both a serious and a humorous side. The humour frequently crops out when the parents of Philippine youngsters who patronise the public schools in constantly increasing numbers, undertake to put into practical application some of the learning absorbed by their offspring and duly reported back to the fond parents at nightfall.

In one of the outlying districts in the Philippines there is an American school teacher known to fame as Mrs. Kelly. She has been one of the most successful teachers in all the islands, and is beloved by her pupils and their parents. Mrs. Kelly's word has been law among them, and the belief that Mrs. Kelly is always right has led to some funny occurrences.

Newton W. Gilbert, ex-Vice Governor of the Philippines, is responsible for the assertion that the first sentence Mrs. Kelly ever taught her pupils nearly wrecked the dignity of the American Government in the Philippines. According to the story, when W. Cameron Forbes, then Governor-General, set out from Manila with the official retinue to make a tour of the islands, he made an official visit to the "Kelly territory."

Word of the visit was sent out far and wide, and when Governor Forbes arrived at the dock he found it thickly populated with chiefs and dattos, in bright-hued and more or less scanty garb, who had come to pay their respects. Governor Forbes descended the gang-plank with all the dignity and solemnity he could muster. Immediately the local dignitaries bowed low in unison and solemnly chanted: "Good morning, Mrs. Kelly." The Governor's official retinue clapped their hands to their mouth to stifle their laughter, while Governor Forbes balanced himself precariously on the narrow gang-plank, trying to recover from the shock.

## BANKS IN GERMANY HAVING BAD TIME.

BERLIN, Feb. 8.—The Berliner Tageblatt says it learns that the Dresden Bank will pay a six per cent. dividend this year instead of 8 1/2 per cent. as previously.

It is also stated that the National Bank of Deutschland has announced that it will pass its dividend. This bank paid 6 per cent. last year.

## URGING OTTAWA TO AID PRODUCTION.

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—Owing to the inability of the Governments of Alberta and Saskatchewan to finance seed grain supplies for settlers on patented lands who lost their crops last year the Federal Government is being urged to come to the rescue. A deputation from Regina Board of Trade is here to-day urging that action be taken. F. Michener, M.P., Red Deer, is also here and it is understood he will present the case of the settlers in Alberta, who need this aid to guarantee next year's production.

The Federal Government has already provided for the settlers on unpatented lands.

The seed oats and wheat was purchased months ago and is now being distributed. To take over the work properly belonging to the Provincial Governments will cost an additional millions.
