Hoover Justified By Finding Of Special Jury

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8. (By the Canadian Press)—A verdict in favor of President Hoover was returned yesterday by the jury he appointed to weigh the truth of statements contained in William H. Gardner's attack upon the administration's naval policy. Fully supporting Mr. Hoover, the committee found that the pamphlet issued by Gardner as President of the Navy League, charging the United States President with "abysmal ignorance" of naval affairs contained "many inaccuracies, false assertions and erroneous conclusions." Aroused by the Gardner attack Mr. Hoover had charged the Navy League head with uttering falsifications and said he would expect a public retraction and an apology after the committee had completed its inquiry. The group made its report yesterday, laying on the president's desk a 10,000 word document accompanied by a lengthy letter of transmittal. Six of Gardner's statements were especially stressed in the letter as incorrect. These were: (1)—That the President and Prime Minister MacDonald of Great Britain had "admittedly" reached agreements never divulged in their entirety. (2)—That the administration refused to allow even an executive session of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to see the full record of negotiations preparatory to the London naval conference. (3)—That Mr. Hoover in 1929 delayed the building of the first five of fifteen cruisers just ordered by Congress as a gesture preparatory to the naval conference not commensurately followed by other powers. (4)—What Gardner termed an obvious inference from a speech by Hugh R. Wilson, Minister to Switzerland that Mr. Hoover under the one year naval holiday just begun intends to forego treaty rights to the construction of 87,000 tons of naval vessels. (5)—What the committee saw as an implication in Gardner's statement that the Washington Treaty established a ratio of 10 to 6 in all classes of naval vessels between the United States and Japan. (6)—And what was regarded as an implication by Gardner that the ratios established by the London Treaty are effective prior to Dec. 1, 1936.

REVENUES OF RAILWAYS

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 10.—Gross revenue of the steam railways in Canada for the year 1930 amounted to \$454,231,650, according to a report issued today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This was a decrease of \$79,574,395 from the previous year, or 15 per cent. Operating expenses in 1930 were reduced to \$380,723,411 from the 1929 figure of \$433,077,113, and net operating revenues amounted to \$73,508,239. This was a drop from the 1929 figure of \$27,520,694. After paying taxes, all rental, interests and other income charges, the net corporate income of all Canadian railways showed a debit of \$27,640,229, as against a credit of \$3,975,146 in 1929.

CANADIAN BOOK WEEK

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 10.—Canadian literary folk will invade Toronto secondary schools to speak on national literature as part of Canadian book week. The week commenced with public libraries featuring the works of Canadians. The English Association, Canadian Authors' Association and Canadian Literature Club held a joint meeting at which Dr. Charles G. D. Roberts, Dean of Canadian Poets, was the Chief Speaker. Several well known Canadian poets read from their own verse. Professor Pelham Edgar of the Canadian Authors' Foundation presided.

STRIKERS ARE RETURNING TO MILLS

(Canadian Press) LAWRENCE, Mass., Nov. 10 — A large proportion of the 23,000 textile workers who went on strike six weeks ago against 10 per cent wage reductions capitulated yesterday and returned to the mills, seeking reemployment. Ten men who were loitering nearby or who tried to dissuade them were arrested, 22 persons were arrested from picket lines in front of the Arlington mills. Thousands of those who went back found no work awaiting them, however. Interruption in manufacturing processes or removal of work by some manufacturers to plants outside the Lawrence district made prompt full reemployment impossible in most instances, while one mill normally employing 5,400 persons was closed indefinitely.

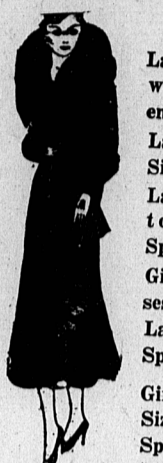
