ICEBREAKERS LEAVE ST LAWRENCE NOV. 30
OTTAWA, Oct. 20 —(CP)—The Transport Department announced tonight ice breakers will be withdrawn from the St. Lawrence Patrol between Three Rivers and Montreal Nov. 30 and ships seeking to reach the Atlantic from the Quebec Metropolis after that date will do so at their owners' risk.
An official explained the move was taken in the interest of shipping which took unnecessary risks in other years, believing presence of icebreakers gave sufficient protection to justify the risk. He said as well the expense involved in keeping the channel open and the hazards faced by icebreakers which often suffered damage in the late fall patrol. Passenger With Automobile Transport
MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 22 — During the past summer a large number of tourists took advantage of the facilities for the transportation of their automobiles by rail over the Canadian National Railways, according to C. W. Johnston, General Passenger Traffic Manager of the company.
This plan to enable tourists to have the use of their own automobile or automobile and trailer, at various resorts has been increasingly popular since its inception by the Canadian National Railways three years ago, stated Mr. Johnston, and it is anticipated that many Canadians who plan to visit resorts in the south and West will take advantage of the plan this winter.
Under this arrangement, the passenger proceeds by railway and the automobile is shipped in freight service, either in advance or after departure of passengers. The charge for transportation of the automobile is one-way first class passenger fare and one-third provided the car owner also holds two one-way or round trip first class tickets reading from point of origin to destination. "Passenger-with-Automobile" plan applies only to full fare tickets and the total cost of two tickets, plus the charge for the shipment of the automobile must be not less than \$56.00 in each direction. If the passengers desire the use of the car at stop-over points enroute. This may be arranged on the payment of a slight additional charge to cover loading and unloading expenses at such points. On shipments to or from points in the United States, the customs formalities are arranged in advance, thus leaving the passenger free to proceed without the necessity of arranging clearance at the international border.

SIX MAILS A YEAR EVENT IN ALASKA

VANCOUVER, Oct. 21 —(CP)—Postmen have to be tough in Alaska. They have only four delivery mails each year, but one regular takes—the postman four weeks' journey by dog sleigh, stopping only for food and sleep.
And that was only one of the Arctic hardships, Dr. Frederick W. Goodman related during a brief stop here before leaving for his station at Fort Point. Dr. Goodman, the Episcopal archdeacon of Arctic Alaska, has been there since 1925.
Ministering to 600 Eskimos and five white people, he covers a territory the size of England by dog team, and often goes 300 miles to preach one sermon.
"Down here," he said jovially, "I hear people complain when the grocery boy is 10 minutes late or if they do not get a letter for 24 hours. They should get to Alaska. There we get our provisions once a year, by steamer from Seattle and if by chance we get six mails instead of four it is considered an event."
