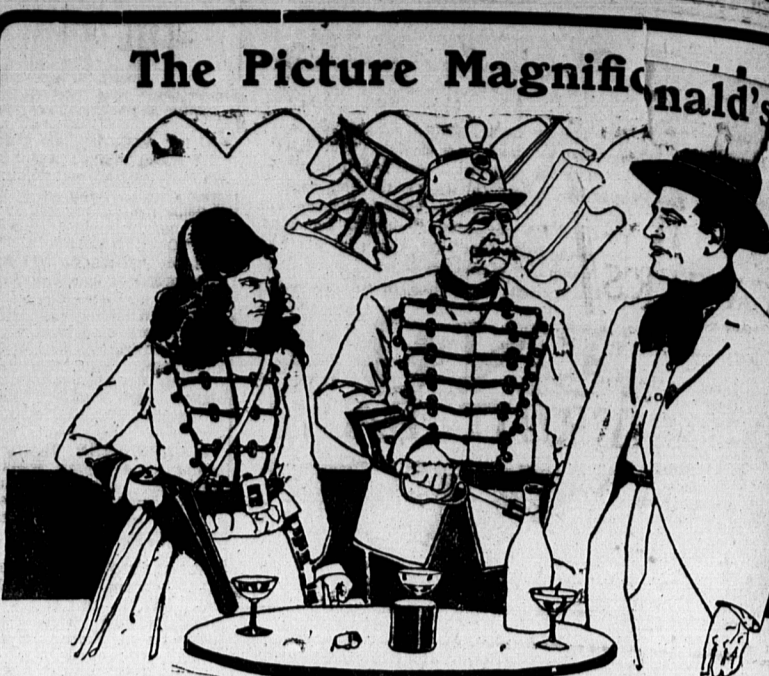

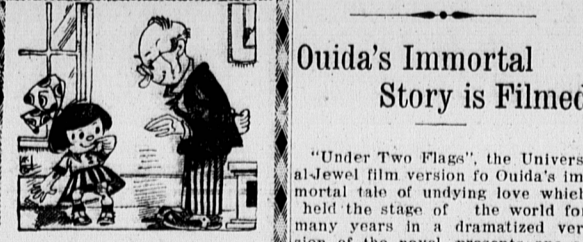

Exchequer Court Perhaps one of the most interesting cases to come before the Exchequer Court is being tried before His Lordship L. A. Audette of Ottawa in the Supreme Court Chambers in this city. This is a case of the widow of the late Frank Howard Hale vs. the King, claiming damages to the amount of 25,000 for the loss by death of her husband which occurred in March 1921. The late Frank Hale, was employed in the C. N. R. machine shops in this city and while at work a chain holding the tender of a locomotive, parted, the tender pinning deceased underneath. Death resulted from the injuries sustained. Yesterday a number of witnesses were examined; when the court adjourned at 1 o'clock the examination of Parker Moore, machinist, C. N. R.
