WESTERN FARMERS AND THEIR DEMANDS.

A well-informed correspondent writes The Guardian: "The invasion of Ottawa by the farmers of the West is the most significant event in our economic life which has happened these thirty years."

The Association which these delegates represent numbers 30,000 farmers, and it is growing every day. Their paper, 'The Grain Growers' Guide, after only four years of existence, has attained a circulation of 20,000 copies. It is mentioned by Lord Cromer in a recent article in the Nineteenth Century, although it has so far received but little notice in Eastern Canada.

They began with the Bell Telephone Company, and they achieved success, breaking down the monopoly that existed, securing a wide extension of the telephone system in the three prairie Provinces, under Government control and at reduced rates.

Right or wrong, they are convinced that protection exists for the benefit of the city dwellers, the financier, the

manufacturer, the speculator and the middleman, and is adverse to the interests of the rest of the population, which in Canada numbers about 72 per cent. of the whole. Roderick Mackenzie, the Secretary, has made a calculation which has not been disproved, that the tariff tax on the equipment necessary for the average farmer amounts to over \$200 per head, and this estimate takes no account of the levy on clothing and personal necessities.

It is to be kept in mind that a similar movement is very widespread in the United States and was strong enough to overturn the majority in Congress at the election of a few weeks ago and is still gathering strength. The farmers of Ontario, too, like their brethren in the West, are waking up to the unfairness of the existing tariff, and here in Prince Edward Island, where the farmers' hitherto small direct taxes are being increased, they are setting themselves to find out what is the extent of the indirect taxation which the protected manufacturers of Ontario and Quebec have been exacting.

Where to all this may grow we know not, but our correspondent, from whose facts and statements we have drawn liberally, predicts that "at the next election we shall see some strange things." He adds: "My own fear is that the movement will gain such headway before the politicians and protectionists become aware of its seriousness that our whole fiscal fabric will fall in ruins."

THE EXAMINER AND RECIPROCITY.

We have certainly no desire to misrepresent The Examiner, and therefore quote its words, as follows:

"Sydney, as it is today is, we all know, one of the results of the National Policy the destruction of which is involved in the adoption of a treaty of Reciprocity with the United States."

Our contemporary now argues that "the clear meaning of this is that the destruction of the National Policy is involved in the adoption of a treaty of reciprocity." We accept this interpretation, and agree with The Examiner that the great industries of Sydney would still "make a gallant struggle for continued existence" even under reciprocity, "and would not easily be destroyed."

So far from being opposed to reciprocity, or believing that reciprocity would destroy anything good in Canada, he declared in his famous resolution of March 7, 1877 in the House of Commons, that his policy would "greatly tend to procure for this country, eventually, a reciprocity of trade."

greatly concern them, and which involves serious constitutional changes. The bad fact is that the Maritime fathers of confederation, great men though they were, lacked forecast as to how the scheme of confederation would work out. They tied our hands. By their action we are bound.

Courts, or Privy Council cannot relieve us. Parliament will not move to amend the terms of union except on the request of all the Provinces. The Provinces decline to recommend relief. They simply "stand pat" under the constitution as it is. What remains for the Maritime Provinces to do? They must accept the situation and face manfully their losses of the past and their diminishing representation in the future. They must strive to make up in the ability, weight and influence of the men they send to Ottawa, for the loss in numbers. It will be idle and ruinous to send to Ottawa hereafter mere office-seekers or voting machines or tame followers of the party leaders. And we must insist that the thin line of Maritime representation as it diminishes by inexorable process of law shall be kept as full as the law allows and the constitution requires.
