## MALPEQUE

On Sunday, Dec. 14th, the services in Princeton United Church were of a very special nature. Both morning and evening services were set aside as memorial services, due to a presentation of memorial rooms fitted and furnished especially for young people's work by F. J. and Mrs. Lockerby in memory of their son, Earle J. Lockerby, and all the other boys from Princeton congregation who also gave their lives in the Great War. At both services there were present with the pastor Rev. E. M. Aitken, Rev. Dr. Clarence MacKinnon of Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, and Rev. B. C. Salter, B. A. of St. Paul's United Church, Sussex, N. E.

At the morning service Rev. Mr. Salter told in a most marvellously interesting and effective way the story of his comradeship with Earle Lockerby, of their meeting at college, of their becoming friends, of their enlisting together, of their going over to France, of their transfer from the Cyclist Corps to the 42nd Battalion, of their comradeship in the trenches until the day came that brought the attack from which Earle did not return.

After the service of worship, the donor, Mr. Lockerby, came forward and presented to the pastor on behalf of the congregation the gift and trust. At the time appointed a row of the flags of the Allies that draped the large folding doors that open the rooms into the main auditorium were drawn aside by Ernest and Lloyd Lockerby, brother and nephew of the fallen hero, and the memorial was dedicated by Dr. MacKinnon. The ceremony throughout was exceedingly impressive and will long be remembered by those who were present.

The memorial tablet to be placed in the rooms will bear the following inscription: "These rooms were prepared and furnished by F. J. and Mrs. Lockerby in memory of their son, Earle Lockerby, student for the Christian Ministry and in honor of all the other boys from Princeton congregation who also made the supreme sacrifice in the world war of 1914-1918." At the evening service the pastor was assisted in the service of worship by Rev. Mr. Salter, who read the scripture lesson and led in prayer. The sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. MacKinnon, who took as his text Ephesians 4-12 "For the work of the Ministry." In his usual forceful style he lifted his hearers by the power of his logic and oratory to that mountain peak on which the writer of Ephesians stood as he saw the place to be filled and the purpose to be accomplished by the Christian minister—the man who is mapping out the course of life from the word of God as the captain maps out the course of the ship from the chart before him. The minister is the man at centre, the vital control of life. He appealed for a more universal recognition of the spiritual in life and a fuller consecration to those things which are the most worth while.

Yesterday marked the opening at the Capitol Theatre of a picture combining all the essential ingredients of first class screen entertainment.

It is "Fury of the Wild" an F.B.O. production starring Ranger, the screen's wonder dog, and it is undoubtedly one of the season's outstanding dog pictures. It is somewhat an innovation so far as this type of picture is concerned, the story being based on the loyalty of a dog to an ex-convict who has served a year in prison on a false charge. Discouraged by his prison experience, the youthful jailbird in company with his dog, seeks an honest living. Temptation is constantly thrust upon him but trust in his canine pal forces him to stick to the straight and narrow path. However, he eventually finds that his past forever overtakes him and brands him a social outcast. He struggles in vain to reach a semblance of honest living but finally returns to his gangland pals as they are planning a hotel robbery. He is enlisted in the plot at once and even against the disapproval of his dog, plans to go through with the theft. The manner in which the dog discloses the plot and brings his master to the realization of his error forms a highly dramatic climax. The canine star is entitled to most of the plaudits, because of his perfect pantomime performances. Barbara Worth and Pat O'Brien play the two leading "human" roles and both give excellent portrayals.

## "Scotland Yard," Forceful Drama

Lovers of intense drama colored by plot complications and unusual characterizations were given a treat at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday when "Scotland Yard" Fox Movie-tone drama featuring Edmund Lowe and Joan Bennett opened for an engagement of three days.

Edmund Lowe in a dual role in which he portrays both a criminal and a gentleman was especially pleasing to his admirers who delight in his clever originality. Joan Bennett, who portrays the feminine lead, succeeded admirably in bringing conviction and pathos to a role that demanded these qualities when confronted with one of the most amazing dramatic problems ever screened.
