Church Strife in Mexico Causes Bloodshed

MEXICO CITY, July 28.—The first death from violence in the present conflict between the Government and the Catholic Church is reported by the Agracalientes correspondent of El Universal Grafico. He reports the lynching of the Mayor of Nochistlan, state of Zacatechco, who had attacked a local Catholic priest.

According to the story as sent by the correspondent the priest and the Mayor, Humberto Ceruani, had an argument in the Mayor's office regarding registration. Finally the Mayor drew a pistol and fired at the priest and then ordered him under arrest. The villagers on learning of this, became infuriated, formed themselves into a mob and hanged the Mayor.

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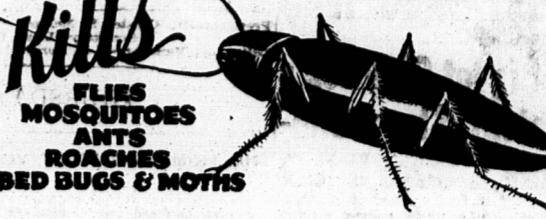

A few canner covers were quoted at around \$2.25. Calves were not in demand and the hog market was unsettled, yesterday's ruling price for straight lots of good quality hogs was \$14.75.
