Rev. J. A. Gordon, Montreal, a native of this province, took a very active part in the recent formation of a Dominion Board of Baptist Foreign Missions. At the convention for the organization of this society he was appointed the secretary.

The anniversary services in connection with the First Methodist Church Sunday School, Charlottetown, were held on Sunday afternoon when a large number of the members of the congregation and the school were in attendance. The reports of the different officers were read and a number of addresses were given, including ex-Mayor Paton and the Pastor. The reports were all very gratifying, showing a large increase in membership during the year. The report of the Superintendent, John F. Wheeler, was also most satisfactory and was supplemented by a few remarks from that gentleman. A splendid program was carried out consisting of solos and choruses by a number of the children and the principal feature of which was a beautiful instrumental trio rendered by three Mt. Allison graduates, Miss Jean Allison, pianist, Miss Myrtle King, cellist, and Mr. Myers, violinist.

The 41st annual report of the Halifax School for the Blind, just issued, says the school has been successfully carried on in the last year. Dr. Fraser, in his report, says 152 blind persons have been under instruction during the past year, of whom 80 were males and 73 females. Of these 15 graduated or remained at home, making the total number registered December 1st, 1911, 135, of whom 70 are males and 65 females. Of these 88 are from the Province of Nova Scotia, 28 from New Brunswick, 4 from Prince Edward Island, 14 from Newfoundland, and 1 from the Bahamas. The superintendent deals with various matters interestingly. Here is one paragraph: "The work of the Home Teaching Society has for the past 17 years been quietly carried on as far as its limited income would allow. Many middle-aged and elderly blind people have been taught to read by the sense of touch and have been supplied with books from the circulating library of the school. Many of those who have thus been taught by our Home Teachers have been encouraged to resume the active duties of life and have succeeded far beyond their own expectations. The receipts of the school for the year were \$30,975.73, the New Brunswick government and municipalities contributing 46,300. The total amount except \$388.54 now in bank, was expended.

The launch is a 22 foot open launch with the engine and accessories well forward and decked over and separated from the cockpit clear of all obstruction and the noise and vibration of the engine is almost completely eliminated which adds much to the comfort of the passenger. The trial trip developed a speed of over nine miles an hour, which will be probably increased when the boat has been well tried out. The "Imperial" manifested its excellence as a motor by going from the first turn and never skipping nor missing an explosion during a period of several hours cruising.

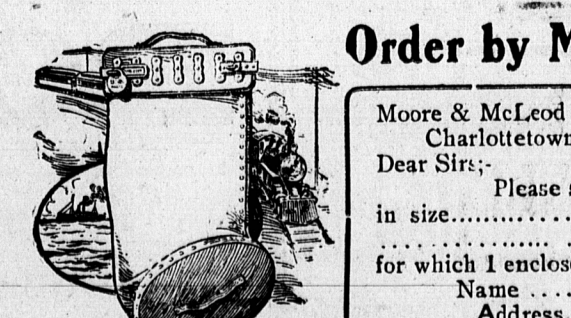
