Canadian Tennis Star Killed In Training Plane Crash

LONDON, Ont., Nov. 25.—(CP)—Leaving Alrcrautman Lewis Dull, 23, one of Canada's leading tennis stars, and Leaning Alrcrautman John Higginbotham, 23, of southern Ontario, were killed instantly late today when their royal Canadian air force training planes crashed in mid-air and crashed near here.

The accident occurred at sundown as the two pilots, engaged in practice solo flights, were preparing to land their planes. One of the pilots was seen to have lost sight of the other plane against the setting sun and to have descended in a rapid glide, before the man below him landed.

The planes collided at an altitude of 500 feet, locked and crashed together in a farm field not far from the Crumlin airport.

Duff was sixth in Canadian tennis rankings for 1940 and was widely known as a tournament player. Higginbotham's company here said they believe he already had obtained a private pilot's licence in New Jersey and that he also was a football player in his home state.

See big Session In Player Trade At Ball Meeting

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—(AP)—For everybody except the Detroit Tigers, who are "in coventry," the annual meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues in Atlanta came Dec. 4, should be a bright, lively trading session.

That's the usual optimistic forecast, even though it may turn out (as it has so often in the past) that the only player trades involve a couple of Joes nobody had been mentioned before the meeting.

Or, does, afterward for that matter, M. Carr, MacPhail just couldn't wait until the Atlanta meeting to announce that he had acquired Kirby Higbe from the Phillies to pitch for the Brooklyn boys, MacPhail may be one of the busiest traders at the session—the just can't resist buying outfielders at \$25,000 a throw.

If it isn't MacPhail who sets the pace it may be Mr. James Dykes of the Chicago White Sox, the American League's most active ivory broker.

About Ted Williams
One trade rumor, complete with details, has pitcher Johnny Rigney and an outfielder going from Chicago to Boston for outfielder Ted Williams, the modern Joe Jackson.

Dykes also would like to pick up in second baseman somewhere, and has to prepare for First Baseman Joe Kuhel's pension.

National League clubs still are mulling at the Phillies' remaining trade bait, pitcher Hugh Mulcahy.

Fear of the draft, of course, may hold up things. The Yankees, now that they have moved out of the American League's doghouse to make room for Detroit, have a lot of elderly talent they would like to dispose of at pre-war prices.

The Yanks have offers for Frank Creswell, who might do a Bartell in a different uniform. But the chance that Uncle Sam may put Phil Rizzuto in khaki for a year is a long one for the Yankees to take.

The market for catchers is bullish. The Cardinals are emphatically overstocked, and the Cubs, Giant's and Dodgers are reportedly in trading mode. Hank Danning, Mickey Owen, Babe Phelps and one of two backstops may change uniforms.

Possibly the Cardinal will peddle Walker Cooper, rockie catcher and brother of pitcher Morten Cooper, but it doesn't seem likely that such a box office attraction would be broken up.

Howe Still Leads N.H.L.

MONTREAL, Nov. 25.—(CP)—Sid Howe, veteran Detroit hockey forward, holds first place alone among National Hockey League individual point-getters after sniping three goals during the past week to break out of a three-way tie for the lead.

Official statistics released today by President Frank Calder show Howe piling the race with four goals and six assists. Two Chicago Black Hawks, George Allen and Harold (Mush) March, fell from a first-place tie with Howe to a third-place deadlock when they were held pointless.

Centre Syd Apps of Toronto Maple Leafs slipped into second place by increasing his point-total to eight with a pair of goals. Tied with Allen and March one point behind Apps is another Toronto player, Gordie Drillon. Alex Motter of Detroit and Bryan Hextall of New York Rangers are next with six points each.

His six assists give Howe top position among the league's playmakers. Allen, with five goals, still is forced to share the berth with young Tony Demers of Montreal Canadiens, who, although scoring five tallies, has earned no assists.

Jack Egan, rookie New York American's defenceman, is off early the most-penalized player with 15 minutes. Cliff Goupille of Montreal Canadiens, with 10 official minutes in penalties plus a 10-minute misconduct, has spent most time in the box but N.H.L. counts misconducts separately.
