BOERS RAID UPON SETTLERS' LAND.

JOHANNESBURG, February 23.—The predation of Boers on loyalists' property are not confined to the Orange River Colony. Generally speaking, they are an idle and unprogressive people, and recent any real improvements on the land which may entail the employment of more labor. "When I took up my section," said a British-born South African, "it was a bare, waterless piece of veldt but by hard work and perseverance wells were sunk and dams made to hold a sufficiency of water to last through the dry season. Things went well enough the first year. Then I turned the land below the dam into gardens, and had to decline to allow other people's stock to water there. As a result I had to station a native to watch the outlet pipes at night as they were being constantly opened, the water wasted, the crops below destroyed.

Some \$1,250 worth of fruit and ornamental trees were planted, but one night a herd of goats were turned in and practically destroyed the lot, together with a few acres of oats and wheat. The Boers strongly object to fencing and they were continually breaking mine down. On one occasion I was away at the coast, and on my return about 150 posts had been uprooted and apparently taken for firewood. The natives live in honor of the Dutch farmers and will not give them away even if they know the culprits.

"Having no fences themselves, the Boers allow their stock to graze anywhere during the winter. I go in large quantities for cultivation and a quantity of stalks and roots are left for my cattle. My neighbors take good care that their beasts have their share of these on which they thrive better than on the dried-up veldt grass. If I suggest that they should pay for the feeding they laugh and say that mine can eat on their lands if I like. As a rule they plough about twenty or thirty acres—just sufficient to keep them through the winter—and half a dozen oxen could eat all there is on their lands in a couple of days. Even growing crops are not safe, and I have at times lost more through neighbors' stock than through loonats. Potatoes when taken up have to be put into the stove immediately; otherwise they disappear with lightning-like rapidity.

"It is no use complaining to the resident magistrate or police as the former says we must conciliate the Boers, and the police are too lazy to trace evil doers, black or white, and grumble if asked to do anything. A good many of the settlers are getting fed up with this sort of a thing, and if it goes on many will give up their holding."

COMMONS TALK OF CIGARETTES

OTTAWA, March 4.—The common talk today their annual set to with the little cigarette. There are a number of members who are against the cigarette, particularly in combination with the small boy, and they annually declare themselves against it. This has been going on several years and probably will for several years more. So far the men against the cigarette have not been able to bring their commendatory resolution to a vote. They were not able to today.

Before the cigarette business came to the fore, the Speaker announced the election of Jacques Bureau, Solicitor General, as a member of the commons.

Mr. Chaholm was told by the Minister of Customs that bounties on petroleum amounted to \$804,000.

Mr. Blain of Peel asked the house to enforce a resolution declaring that a law should be passed forbidding the importation, manufacture and sale of cigarettes.

He said that the number of cigarettes manufactured in Canada had increased from 85,004,400 in 1896 to 270,877,350 in 1906, and imports brought the 1906 consumption up to 377,030,850. Cigarettes were bad for men and worse for boys. Too many were being smoked in Canada.

Mr. MacDonald of Pictou asked if this was not a matter for the provinces.

Mr. Blain thought not. Ralph Smith thought those who wanted to smoke cigarettes would make them for themselves if the manufacture and sale of them was forbidden.
