RESOURCES WILL GIVE OUT BY JUNE.

HAVRE, April 22.—A member of a famous banking firm acquainted with the financial situation in Europe, states that Germany will be at the end of her financial resources by the middle of June. The Germans have taken extreme measures in Belgium to prevent knowledge of the movements of their troops becoming known. Preparations have been made everywhere with a view to eventual retreat. High Prussian officials in Belgium do not disguise their despair and admit that the German cause is lost.

REGISTER HAS LIST OF UNDESIRABLE PEOPLE.

PARIS, April 26.—Tout Paris, a social register of the French capital, just issued, contains the names of 1,500 Parisians killed on the battlefield up to February 25, 1915. Included in this number are the names of twenty generals, 367 other officers, fourteen priests, and 193 titled members of the aristocracy.

The register also gives in a separate list the names of 200 society people in the Tout Paris of last year, who are now classed as "undesirables." This list includes Germans, Austrians and Turks.

FUNERAL OF MR. JAMES KENNEDY, M.L.A.

Never before in the history of Kensington have such scenes of grief and universal regret been witnessed as occurred yesterday on the occasion of the funeral of Mr. James Kennedy, M.L.A. Over two thousand people were present at the ceremony, mourners travelling from far and wide to pay their last respects to one, who in a quiet unostentatious way, had played an important part in furthering the interests of the community. The Kennedy family are held in high esteem, and the late Mr. James Kennedy had especially endeared himself by his many qualities, his business rectitude, and the readiness with which he always placed his services at the disposal of every good cause. He was a valued member of the Presbyterian Church, and none knew better than his minister, the Rev. G. A. Sutherland, the good he did in the community, a prominent member of the order of Oddfellows, and the Loyal Order of Orangemen, the members of these bodies feel his removal while just in his prime, as a sincere personal loss. As a public leader, he was universally respected by both parties, for he was scrupulously fair and honorable in his conduct. He set an example at last election which is likely to be generally followed at the ensuing election of running a clean campaign, entirely free from the distribution of liquor or bribes. He had declared that if he could not be elected on the merits of his party platform and his own personal merits, he preferred not to be elected at all. The electors expressed their confidence in him by sending him to the House by a splendid majority. The suddenness of his demise cast a gloom over the community, and the sorrow felt found expression in the record attendance at the obsequies. A special train went from Charlottetown conveying the members of the local Government, and of the Dominion and local Legislature, together with representatives of the Oddfellows and Orange Lodges, the 4th Regiment Band and others.

The funeral was timed to leave the late residence at two o'clock and at that hour an enormous crowd of mourners had gathered. The procession moved off in the following order to the church:—

- Band.
- Oddfellows.
- The wraths.
- The coffin.
- The chief mourners.
- The Orangemen.
- General mourners.

The church was crowded in every part, special seats being reserved for the Government, and members of the Legislature and the societies. The first part of the service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Sutherland, Rev. Mr. Morris, Methodist, and Rev. Mr. Watson, Anglican. Then the funeral ritual of the Oddfellows was gone through, and afterwards the mourners passed the bier to take a farewell kiss of the features of one they knew so intimately. The procession having been reformed, the cortege proceeded to the station, the band playing the Dead March in Saul. The special train proceeded on its rattling and thence the funeral party went to Springton Cemetery, where the remains were laid to rest; the ritual of the Orange Lodge being used, Rev. D. McLean officiating.

The chief mourners were the deceased's four sons, his father and five brothers. Among the other mourners were Premier Matheson, Hon. J. E. Wyatt, Speaker, Hon. M. McKinnon, J. A. McNeill, Chas. Dalton, A. E. Arsenault, L. L. Jenkins, Senator Murphy, Mr. A. A. McLean, M.P., Mr. Donald Nicholson, M.P., Mr. A. A. Leffur, Judge Stewart and the members of the Legislature.

The pall-bearers were brethren of the Oddfellows, viz., Messrs John Warren, Bradford McArthur, Charles Cook, Edward Urch, John Harding and Hugh Morrison.

A large number of floral tributes were sent, including the following:—From the family, a pillow; from his father, a half-circle; from his brothers, an anchor; from the Government, a wreath; from Orange Lodge, a pillow; from Oddfellows, a pillow; Mr. James K. Gilles, wreath; Mr. P. N. Pate and family, O'Leary, wreath; Mr. E. J. Smith, representing Manchester, Robertson & Allison, St. John, wreath; Mr. J. Kennedy's employees, wreath; Kennedy & Co's employees, O'Leary, wreath.

The music in the church was beautifully and sympathetically rendered by an excellent choir, and included the twenty-third Psalm, and Mr. Kennedy's favourite hymn, "He Gave His Life for Me"; while the Oddfellows rendered "Nearer My God to Thee."

The whole service was impressive in the extreme, and will long be remembered by those privileged to be present.

The arrangements were admirably carried out in every detail.

BRITISH ARE MURDERED BY SAVAGE HUNS.

LONDON, April 22.—That German soldiers in a rage beat British wounded to death is the charge made in a narrative by the official Eye Witness with the British troops, dated April 16th, and given out by the press bureau today.

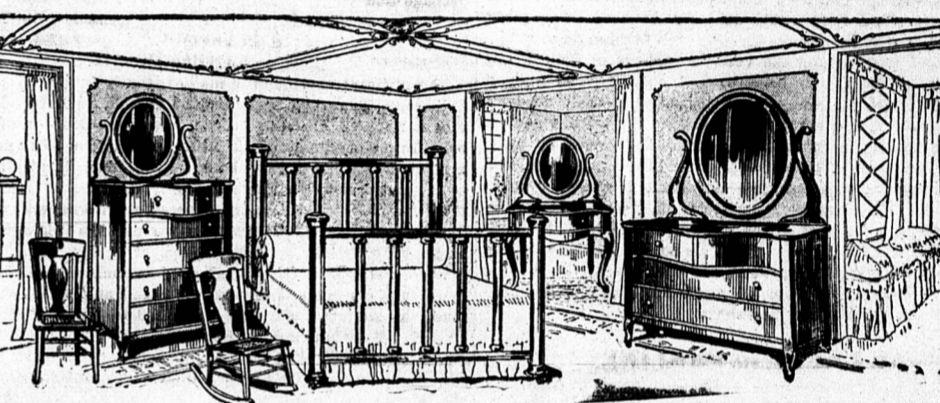

murderers are "hauled in." This serial is full of invention and is perfectly delightful. There is one inestimable feature about all Mary Fuller pictures, that is their reasonable brevity. "Runaway June" is the story of a girl of independent spirit who cannot cherish the thought of being supported entirely by her husband. She wants to earn her own livelihood, and for this purpose has run away from her husband. She is pursued by her husband, Ned, and her family, on the one hand, while her movements are carefully watched by "the stranger with the black vandyc" (a man whom she met on the train in her runaway escapade) whose motives are sinister. Her adventures are extremely interesting, at times thrilling, and always leave one wondering what the next move will be. Last night the fourth episode was shown and the instalment was more than usually entertaining. "June" is the same girl who for so many weeks delighted patrons of the People's Theatre in the "Florence" series, and this is saying enough in her behalf. "Shorty's Trip to Mexico" was an exciting two-part drama of Mexican life and showed how a rough man was ready to go through "thick and thin" to save his betrothed. The program was altogether an excellent one.

PARIS NEWSPAPERS PRAISE PRESIDENT WILSON.

PARIS, April 26.—The newspapers of Paris comment with approval on the utterances of President Wilson in regard to the relations of the United States with belligerent nations, in his speech at the luncheon of the Associated Press in New York on April 20.
