Chilly weather is reported from many places in the Canadian west, extending from the great lakes to the foothills of the Rockies.

### LIVES LOST ON TRANSCONTINENTAL

Construction Number Sixty Eight Killed and Many Injured.

OTTAWA, Oct. 18.—(Special.)—The cost of the National Transcontinental in human life will not be small. Last year sixty-eight men were killed, and twenty-two were seriously injured, the accidents were mostly in the handling of explosives, and fatalities are chiefly among foreigners.
