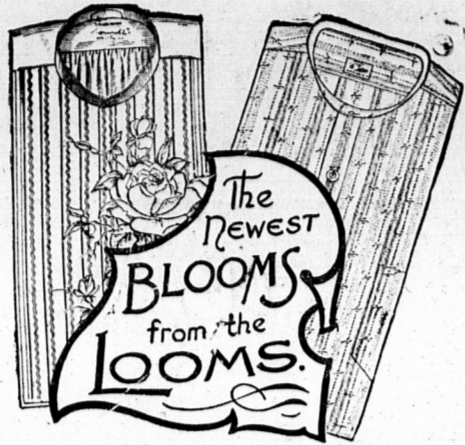

OFFICIALS CHANGE AT THE COLLIERIES

Seven Important Changes of Coal Company Officials About to Take Place.

GLACE BAY, August 19.—It is reported here, though not officially, that several important changes among the Dominion Coal Company officials are about shortly to go into effect. These include the appointment of Alex McEachern, as superintendent No. 1 district; transfer of Mr. Christensen to superintendency of district No. 3; Bart Connors as manager of No. 5 (Reserve) colliery, and Alex. F. McNeil, as manager of No. 1, International, No. 1, district, comprising collieries Nos. 1, 5, 10 and 8. No. 3 district comprises collieries Nos. 3, 4, 6, 12 and 14. The remaining collieries comprise district No. 2, which will remain under Norman McKenna, as at present.

DREDGING SURVEY ST. JOHN RIVER

ST. JOHN, August 20.—Resident Engineer Shewan, of the public works department, is arranging a survey of the St. John river between Fredericton and Woodstock, to determine the extent and character of all the shoals and rapids, and to report of the work necessary to clean them out and make the river navigable all through the summer. This work has been ordered by the department of public works and it is presumed will be followed by dredging and other operations to make the river navigable, and so give the up-river section water communication all through the summer. The section of the river to be covered is about sixty miles in length.

ALL-RED ROUTE WINS THE RACE.

MONTREAL, Aug. 20.—An international race that was a good deal for Canadian trade, closed at New York today, when the C. P. R. landed a shipment of silk from Yokohama several days ahead of racing competitors from Japan and the United States, once again demonstrating the superiority of the Canadian route between the Orient and Europe. On July 21 the C. P. R. steamer Montego, the Japanese steamer Tosa Maru and the Pacific mail steamer China left Yokohama together, bound respectively for Vancouver, Seattle and San Francisco. Each carried part of a consignment of silk bound for London via New York, the consignors experimenting to see which the most suitable route. The Montego reached Vancouver August 4, the Tosa Maru arrived at Seattle on the 6th, and the China docked at San Francisco on the 7th. This afternoon the Canadian shipment was delivered at New York. It will be at least two days before the Tosa Maru's load reaches the same port, and a day or two later before the shipment via San Francisco gets there, by which time the shipping via the C. P. R. will be nearing the shores of England. The race has been watched with keen interest by shipping and railway circles, and the signal victory of the Canadian route is expected to have a good effect in increasing trade between the Orient and Europe via the Dominion trade route.

SCHOONER BURNED BY GRAND BANKS

SYDNEY August 20.—Word was received here today that the French fishing schooner Acadienne, Captain Poulard, St. Pierre, was totally destroyed by fire early Sunday morning August 9th, while the vessel was at anchor on the Grand Banks. The fire originated in the fore-castle of the vessel, and was caused by the upsetting of a stove, and so rapidly did the flames spread that the men had barely time to jump from their berths on to deck and take to the dories before the vessel was all in flames. Not one particle of their effects did the men save, but they considered themselves fortunate to distance from the burning vessel the hull sink. Several hours after the men were picked up by the French fishing vessel Made Pique, and three days later landed in St. Pierre, and it is understood was injured.

What the attitude of Mrs. Hains will be is of paramount interest and importance to the lawyer for the Hains brothers and to the district attorney. Rumors were rife today that Mrs. Hains will drop her hostile demeanor toward her husband and would take her place at his side when the trial came.

Captain Hains and his brother will be represented by the most eminent counsel that can be procured. John F. McIntyre, a former assistant district attorney, was retained today and it was said that an effort would be made to get Martin W. Littleton, who defended Harry—Thaw, to join the defense. Mr. Littleton is now in Europe. An evening paper quotes Mr. McIntyre as saying that insanity will be the defence.

COURTNEY BAY AS SEVENTY MINERS IN EXPLOSION

ST. JOHN, August 20.—From the Courtney Bay borings carried on to date, H. M. Davy, the Ottawa public works engineer in charge, said last night that his report would be entirely favorable to Courtney Bay as a terminus for the Grand Trunk Pacific railway. The borings, he said, have demonstrated that it would be easy to dredge the bay, as practically no rock or hard pan has been encountered and the soil is a sandy loam near the mouth of the bay, and inside the mud and clay would be easily removed. In the opinion of the engineer, the rocky ledge on shore would give an excellent foundation for the new wharves. He added his report would be entirely favorable to Courtney Bay as a terminus. He will conclude his operations in two or three weeks if the weather is favorable.

WORLD WIDE CONFERENCE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

NEW YORK, N. Y., Aug. 20.—A foreign missionary conference composed of missionaries and missionary workers from all parts of the world will be held in Edinburgh (Scot.), in June, 1910. The forthcoming conference is being organized by the World Council of Churches, which will be the third of its kind, and has received the endorsement of President Roosevelt, William H. Taft, James Bryce, the British ambassador to the United States, and others, and Dr. S. L. Barton, of Boston, and Dr. J. L. Europe, of Boston, are at present in Europe engaged in arranging for general committees to consider various branches of church work.

FLIGHT OF GERMAN ARMSHIP

BERLIN, Aug. 20.—The military steamer balloon which sailed last night from Jemel at 10 o'clock last night returned at dawn to the balloon enclosure having been in the air so long less than 6 hours. The course taken by the airship and the experience of those on board have been kept secret as the army aeronauts are endeavoring to practice with his dirigible under conditions resembling war.
