The site selected is part of the Beer estate situated between the railway track and the Mr. Edward Road, immediately in the rear of brick building which occupies that wedge of land which forms the corner between the railway track and the St. Peter's and Mt. Edward Roads. It is now time for the O'Leary Jail to skidoo.

The men of the City artillery companies have had a spell of strenuous work during the past fortnight under the instruction of Quarter Master Sergeant Smith of the Canadian Permanent force. Although there are a large number of recruits in the companies the men present a fine appearance and the scene at the Drill Shed every evening is one of interest and animation. In addition to company drill gun teams are practiced with the 4.7 guns and the manner in which they are able to handle these mighty engines of war is simply amazing.

Last evening the members of the newly organized 82nd Battalion Regiment marched out to the Park with their instruments and made music resound in the air. The band is composed of thirty-two young musicians who have made wonderfully good progress under Bandmaster Strumberg, a veteran at the work. Although they have never before had the opportunity to march out they last night acquitted themselves most creditably, and played some stirring marches with animation and brought a great many visitors to the Park. When they became accustomed to marching the band will no doubt be able to lead the gallant 82nd.

Norman and Mrs. McDonald celebrated the twentieth anniversary of their marriage recently at Bellieria, Mass., by holding a china wedding, at which were present more than one hundred and fifty of their friends and relatives from Boston and the outlying suburbs. Numerous and costly presents, attesting to the popularity of Mr. and Mrs. McDonald were received, china ware being greatly in evidence; while several valuable pieces of parlor furniture were presented by friends in North Bellieria. The Mr. McDonald referred to is a native of this Province, having been in Springfield, fifty-nine years ago, and is a son of the late Donald McDonald, a man of patriarchal bearing and appearance, who was one of a stalwart band of young Highlanders who had emigrated from Scotland to Prince Edward Island in the early thirties, when it was sparsely settled and Charlottetown was only a village. He decided to settle in Lot 67, which at that time with little exception was an unbroken wilderness of forest, unmolested, save by wild animals, yet he succeeded as did all those early pioneers in making for himself a comfortable home. Norman left home in 1868, going to Waltham, Mass., remaining there a short time, then going to Pennsylvania, where he worked in the lumber industry, later going in the same capacity to Manitoba and other parts of the West, and after varied experiences went to Bellieria in 1883, where he worked on the construction of the B. & M. Railroad, and later in the Talbot & Faulkner Mills. In 1887 he married Maria Trefoy of Yarmouth, N. S., with whom he went west for the second time in 1888, but returned to Bellieria nearly two years ago and purchased a farm among the many friends he made for himself.
