NINE MEN'S LIVES LOST.

MONTREAL, Nov. 12.—Seven and perhaps nine men lost their lives in the Lachine Canal at Cote St. Paul early this evening when a flat bottom boat capsized throwing fifteen workmen into the water. All were employed in the construction of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company's new power plant at Cote St. Paul. It is believed that all are foreigners whose names will not be known until the Power Company's time keeper checks up to-morrow morning.

BOAT TURNED TURTLE

It is understood that indirect cause of the accident was due to the passing of a tug, and the injudicious movement of the men from one side of the boat to the other; as the craft passed through the tug's swells. The tug put back as soon as the boat turned turtle and rescued two of its former occupants. A boat put out from shore rescued four others and two reached the south shore on planks sent floating in the canal by watchers on the beach. Two others were seen swimming for the north bank, but in the darkness it is not known whether they reached it.

MEN FOUGHT FOR PLACES.

About two hundred men crossed the canal night and morning in the single flat bottom boat as a short cut to a suburban car line and the consequent congestion has been the subject of comment frequently owing to the danger of passing craft. It is stated that more might have been saved but for the scrambling for positions of vantage on the upturned boat which swamped from the pressure put upon it by the fighting men.

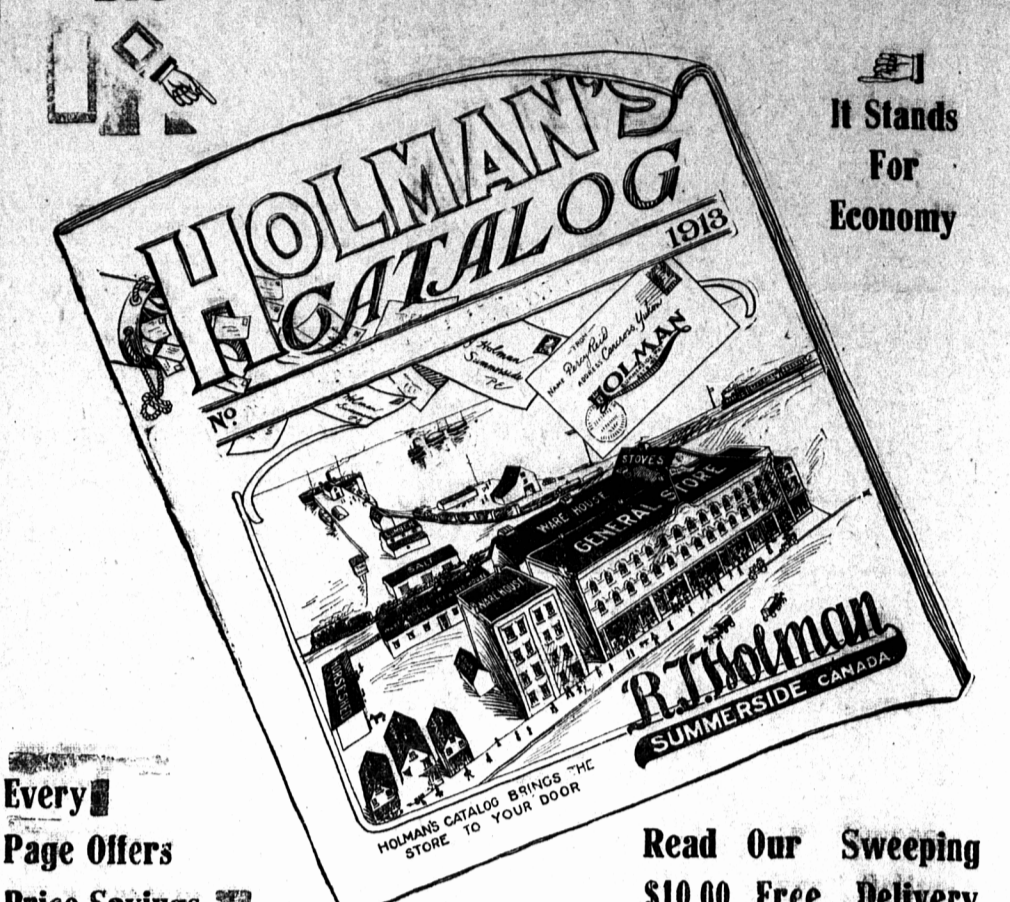
MINDELL NOT TO BE APPOINTED.

PAPER DISCLOTHS

Paper, as a first aid to home-keeping, has undergone a wonderful development during the last few years. Formerly it was only the individual thrifty housewife who guessed at its possibilities and utilized it extensively in her household tasks. Now, it appears as a commercial product in many different forms designed for specific services. One of the newest paper products, and one of the most unique, is a paper dishcloth. Nothing could sound more impracticable than a dish rag made of paper. But this particular kind of paper is a stiff parchment. In water it becomes as soft and as pliable as fabric, and it will not go to pieces. It is used as an ordinary piece of cloth is used and then washed and wrung out and used again. It has a smooth surface which absorbs nothing.

It is equally good for scouring pots and pans and may be used with any of the cleaners marketed for this purpose. One dish rag of paper is sufficient for any dishwashing from cut glass to skillet. The fastidious housewife may raise her eyebrows at this; but it is perfectly true. Then it is washed out, or rather off, and is again fresh and clean. When it dries, it again becomes stiff and it is not yellow or soiled but fresh and white as when new.

THE EMBROIDERED POCKET.

By way of introducing a touch of color into the sombre hues of dark tailored coats and skirts, the embroidered pocket has appeared, and is found on many of the newest models from Paris for morning and afternoon wear. For example, a face cloth costume in deep royal blue, is severely plain, with the exception of the small breast pocket which is worked with silks and wools in such vivid shades as orange, blue red and purple, the motif chosen being somewhat oriental in effect, and small enough only to cover the patch-pocket itself. The captain had turned off his motor power and was descending peacefully when a gust of wind caused his machine to tip over at a height of only 15 feet from the ground. The aviator was thrown out, and the motor fell on him, crushing him to death.
