PEBISSITE COUNT.—In

yesterday's plebiscite count in Queen's County the voting in the 3rd District was 729 for and 517 against. The 5th District which includes Charlottetown and Royalville, 18 votes counted a majority of 18 for and 109 against. The vote was: Prohibition, 322; Beer and Wine, 1045. There are 22 polls yet to be heard from in this District. Besides this there are 18 polls which include the men from this province on military duty on the mainland. An unofficial estimation places the number of voters in the soldiers' section at 1,000. The soldiers who are overseas did not vote in the plebiscite.

NEW MINISTER NAMED.—At

a meeting of the Executive Council on Thursday the Honourable Horace Wright, President of the Executive Council, was appointed Minister of Agriculture and Settlement. As a result of the recent Ottawa conference, the administration of problems connected with settlement of the quota of refugees from Europe and the assistance of the Government, Mr. Wright will organize his departmental administration on Monday. It is anticipated that the field work in this connection will be done through voluntary service while the office administration will be carried on by existing employees of the Provincial Government under the direction of Mr. Wright.
