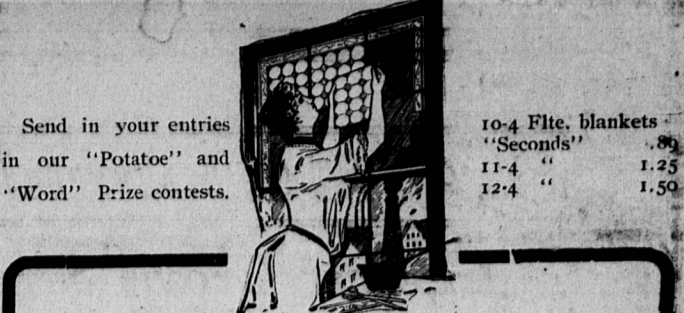

A BALLOONISTS THRILLING EXPERIENCE

QUEBEC, Oct. 23.—The German and Swiss balloons Germania and Helatia came down some miles away from a G. T. P. construction camp in Northern Quebec, and were lost for 30 hours the occupants suffering greatly from cold and hunger. Captain Hugo Von Obercron and August Blankertz tell the story of their reaching Cocococachic on the Transcontinental, and cold driving them almost insane before reaching the camp fire. Here is the Captain's story.
"We had been going steadily to the Northwest after leaving the Georgian Bay district averaging twenty-five miles an hour for over nine hours without seeing a sign of life or human habitation, and were only looking for some evidence of civilization near which to land when we passed over the line of the new Transcontinental railway. We were then nearly 6,000 metres, or about 18,000 feet high and we immediately opened the valve to let out the gas and descend.
"Owing to our great height the balloon drifted a distance of five miles before it came down in the tops of a dense forest and we had to let ourselves down by the rope. Though certain that we had not gone more than five miles past the railway line, we found ourselves in an almost impenetrable growth of brush where no European foot had ever trod. A strong Indian may have passed there, but a white man never.
"It was then 11.15 on Wednesday morning. All our instruments and effects we brought down the rope and landed at the foot of a tree with our heavy fur coats and a fortnight's supply of food.
"Imagining that it would only be a matter of three or four hours to reach the railway, we set out at noon with only a half a bottle of champagne, a couple of crusts of bread, a revolver and an electric lamp, very unwisely leaving our coats behind.
"The experience of hours after hour almost running into days that followed, as related by Mr. Blankertz, can only be equaled by tales of the early voyagers in the trackless wilds of the Northland and with the advantage very much in favor of the

voyagers in that they had knowledge of brush work. Half an hour's groping in through the wood brought them to the edge of a small lake, from which rose myriads of wild ducks and geese, probably startled from their haunts for the first time by a man.
"After six hours of this constant struggling through the interminable morass and bush, darkness came down suddenly and Von Obercron and Blankertz began to fear they were lost. All this time they had been going as near West as possibly as the balloon was going due East when they crossed the railway tracks. Not a trace of an Indian hunter, or trapper had been encountered all the way, and hunger and thirst began to assert themselves. The half bottle of champagne and few crusts of bread had been devoured long since. Knowing little of the geography of Northern Canada, except that an inhabited portion stretched away to the Polar seas, they feared that their compass may have gone wrong, and that they might be going in the wrong direction altogether.

A RACING SCHR.
LONDON, Oct. 24.—William Fife, the yacht designer has accepted a contract to build a racing schooner for an owner whose name is not divulged. The avowed purpose of the owner, however, is to secure a racer capable of defeating the American schooner Westward, owned by Alexander S. S. Cochrane, of New York. Bailed by Captain Chas. Barr, the Westward won the feature events at the Kiel and Cowes regattas last summer.
GREAT COAL DISCOVERY.
