Rod LaRocque's New Picture "The Fighting Eagle" Scores

IT IS AN INTERESTING STORY OF NAPOLEONIC DAYS IN FRANCE AND IS PACKED WITH DRAMA AND THRILLS.

Packed from start to finish with highly thrilling and charming scenes, "The Fighting Eagle," Rod LaRocque's latest De Mille star picture, was heartily received on its premier showing at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday. The production, superbly directed by Donald Crisp, rises at times to the dignity of great drama, and the featured players including Phyllis Haver, Julia Faye, Sally Rand and Sam de Grasse appeared to excellent advantage.

The fascinating period of Napoleonic rule in France is the background of one of the best pictures in which Mr. LaRocque has been seen since he became a star. The star is seen as an ambitious country boy whose sole desire is to attach himself to the Emperor's guard.

He accomplished this by certain deeds of daring in behalf of Countess de Launay, a secret agent of Napoleon, with whom he falls in love and whom he aids against the treacherous intrigues of Talleyrand, one of Napoleon's ministers. Etienne Gerard

Returns From Dental Convention

Dr. T. E. Robbins returned recently from Washington, D. C., where he attended the National American Dental Convention, the largest and most successful convention of its kind ever held. There were more than 14000 representatives, including delegates from England, France, Norway, Sweden and Germany. About 1000 of these were Dental Hygienists who held their own separate meetings.

The headquarters were at the Mayflower Hotel, the convention being held in the huge auditorium, where lectures were delivered, moving pictures shown, clinics conducted and operations performed in oral surgery by specialists. Dr. H. S. Thompson formerly of Moncton, and well known all over Canada gave a splendid address on oral hygiene pertaining to school children in Canada. Dr. Bell of Baltimore, old-time hockey star of Charlottetown had a very interesting exhibit of sculpture work in wax. The proportions and pose of these minute figures were wonderful. Dr. Bell was highly complimented by a very famous sculptor. Dr. Robbins met Dr. Harry Hodgson, formerly of this city, president of the Winnipeg Dental Society, also his brother Gordon, who has an extensive practice in Garden City, Long Island. The Washington dentists excelled themselves in making things pleasant for visitors. The entertainment consisted of a reception at the White House, a marvelous display of fireworks and trips to beautiful Arlington Cemetery where is located the tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Dr. Robbins had a "fit" over Washington from the Hoover airport, and says that Washington is the most beautiful city he has visited, having no manufacturing industries, no telephones poles, no buildings over twelve stories high, beautiful wide thoroughfares lined with trees, and numerous parks where children can play. The doctor saw a world's series baseball game at Philadelphia, and a tie foot ball game between Harvard and West Point.

The Napoleon as played by Max Barwyn was a realistic one and it is safe to say that Barney's Napoleon will long live in the memory of the admirers of the Little Corporal. The supporting players rendered highly efficient performances.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Ont. 25—Egg markets continued to display a firm trend and with a continued shortage of receipts some further price advances have been recorded. Toronto. This egg market continues firm with receipts of fresh eggs light. Prices are unchanged from yesterday. Montreal. Eggs receipts here today were 1,221 cases as compared to 336 cases on the same day last year. The market continues firm under a good demand and the price of fresh extras to retailers has been advanced to sixty four cents, with other grades unchanged. Vancouver—Dealers here are quoting producers for ungraded eggs, extras 85; firsts 80; pullets extra 45. Prices to retailers are, extras sixty to sixty-five cents; firsts fifty-six to sixty cents; pullet extra fifty to fifty-three cents. St. John. This egg market is firm and steady, following the recent rapid advances. The more general use of storage eggs is limiting the demand for fresh, which are now jobbing at extras fifty-five to fifty-six cents; fifty to fifty-two cents; seconds thirty-nine to forty cents. Halifax. There has been a further advance of one to two cents in paying prices on this egg market, but the jobbing prices of fresh eggs are unchanged. The price of storage firsts to retailers has been advanced to forty-three to forty-four cents. Montreal, Que. Oct. 25—Owing to the reported limited available supply of fresh eggs, retail traders will be forced to pay as high as sixty-three cents for extras on the Montreal produce market next week, all fresh eggs will be advanced from two to three cents per dozen, it was announced, while storage eggs will be increased one cent for all grades in a wholesale car lot way. Ontario fresh eggs were quoted today at fifty-six cents for extras; 45 cents for firsts and 33 for seconds delivered here. With the exception of a slight decrease in potato price, quotations in other sections of the market remained unchanged. Quebec potatoes were quoted today from \$1.25 to \$1.30 with New Brunswick's ranging from \$1.45 to \$1.60.
