CROSSLEY AND HUNTER. DYNAMITE

Fifteen Years in Evangelistic Work—A Successful Record.

Fifteen years ago the 12th of July we began our union evangelistic work in the town of Essex Centre, and from then until now we have been privileged to continue in this blessed work, holding union services in every city in the Dominion, except some in the Province of Quebec, and in many of the towns and villages from Atlantic to Pacific, as also in Bermuda, Newfoundland, and several cities in the territory of Uncle Sam. We are rejoiced and grateful to be able to say that during the past fifteen years between seventy-five and one hundred thousand have professed saving faith in the meetings we have been privileged to hold with the pastors and churches.

It may be interesting to not a few to read a short account of the services for the last conference year. After recuperating for a few weeks in Muskoka we began the year's work on August 14th, 1898, in the town of Sutton; and from there went to St. George and then to Clinton. The pastors and churches in all these places heartily emulated one another, and many were "added to the church."

Minneapolis was next visited, and many turned to the Lord, including the Hon. John W. Arcander, the account of whose conversion has encouraged so many to stronger faith. We then enjoyed a few days in meetings with the churches in St. Peter; after which we spent Christmas at home, and began a month's campaign in the People's Temple, Boston, where we had been just four years before. It was a joy to us to have on the platform in Boston at the same time four young ministers, who had been converted in our meetings in other days; two Baptists from Nova Scotia, one a Methodist from Ontario, and one a Presbyterian from Boston.

The frequent invitations from the churches in Newfoundland were at length yielded to, and truly it was a Macedonian call for a great and effectual door was opened unto us; and one of the greatest, if not the greatest work of our lives, was witnessed in St. John's and Carbonear, where over eighteen (1800) sought the Lord in seven weeks and a day. We do not adopt the practice

of scattering cards, and gathering up a large number of names of those who have been little moved, but persons must come out publicly and confess their decision to be real Christians, or earnest seekers. This will be manifest when we intimate that over eleven hundred (1100) united with the Methodist churches in the above named cities, and hundreds of the others are now members of other churches in these cities, or in the outports.

We returned to Boston in April, and held services in Dudley street Baptist church, which has a membership of about one thousand (1,000). The Baptists are strong in the New England States and are very cordial and evangelic. We, as ministers of a sister church, by the invitation of the pastor, sat down with him and his people at the Lord's table. After a joyful month in Boston we returned to Canada and held a series of union services with the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist, and Congregational churches in Point St. Charles, Montreal, during the month of May; and then closed the year's work in union meetings in the town of Arthur on Sabbath 2nd inst.

We joy in God that He has in every place we have been privileged to visit given the churches a gracious revival. We keep a yearly souvenir book in which the s-er-ati-ies of the meetings record the names of those who publicly profess to enlist on the Lord's side, and in counting the names are we thank God and take courage to see that nearly five-thousand (5,000) names are inserted. Many they also be found in the Lamb's Book of life on the last great day.

Many invitations from Boston, Minneapolis, Springfield, (Mass.) Philadelphia, Toronto, Stratford, Calcutta, (India) and other places have been received, but we are planning to spend most of the next year in Canada.

We are now in our island in Muskoka to rest, recuperate and study and so help to fit us for the best year we have seen in the work of the Lord.

MISSILES

Used By Cleveland Street Car Strikers

TERRORISE THE CITY

Police Force Charge Several Times Upon the Rioters on the Tracks.

CLEVELAND, O., July 22.—Rioting was resumed in the Street Railway yesterday evening, serious outbreaks having occurred in several places. About 9 o'clock a dynamite cartridge was exploded under the wheels of a Euclid avenue car at the corner of Erie and Prospect streets. The wheels of the car were destroyed by the explosion, which was heard for a distance of two miles, and one woman, a passenger, fainted, but nobody was injured. There was no crowd in the vicinity, nor was anybody seen to place the cartridge.

Earlier in the evening all the available police on duty in the downtown district were called to the Humboldt street viaduct on the Broadway line, where a riot was in progress. A crowd of a thousand men and boys were engaged in piling obstructions on the tracks. Ropes were thrown over the trolley wires in attempt to pull them down. Only one policeman was on duty at the viaduct. He was stoned and driven from the scene, and a girl was hit with a stone and seriously hurt. Three patrol loads of police responded to the call, and the mob was dispersed.

A dynamite bomb was thrown upon the roof of the big Consolidated Street Railway Company's barn at Lakeview at 3 a. m. to-day. A jagged hole two feet square was torn in the roof. A Wade Park avenue car, which stood directly beneath the hole, was wrecked, the roof being torn off by the explosion. The wildest excitement prevailed among the men in the barn. The explosion was heard for blocks, and hundreds of people were attracted to the scene. No one was injured. Many of the windows in the big barn were shattered by the explosion. The shock was such as to cause the ground to tremble, and it seemed for a few moments though the barn itself would fall. The police suspect two men, who were seen about the building acting in a suspicious manner. In the excitement attendant upon the explosion they, however got away.

Count Ito's Wife.

A Japanese lady is noted for her courage, her strength of mind, and self-possession. It is wonderful to think what physical trials and dangers these fragile little creatures will undergo in an emergency. The late Prime Minister's life was saved by the courage and presence of mind of his wife.

Many years ago, when quite a young man, during a rebellion, Count Ito was hiding from his enemies, who, having tracked him to his house, sent a band of "soobis" to assassinate him. On hearing his enemies approaching, and trapped like a rat in its hole, the Count drew his sword, and prepared to die, but the Countess whispered, "Do not die, there is hope still," and, removing the

"hibstchi," or fire-box, and lifting up the mats and the planks beneath, she induced her husband to conceal himself in the hollow space which exists under the floor of all Japanese houses. The murderers broke into the room just as the fire-box had been replaced, and demanded of the Countess their victim. In vain they threatened and cruelly ill-treated her, dragging her about the room by her long hair. But it was of no avail; they could not shake her resolute fidelity. Thanks to her courage Count Ito escaped, and has lived to give to his country a new constitution and become one of the greatest statesmen of modern Japan. I often wonder when I see the Countess, now a delicate gray-haired little lady, at the courage and presence of mind that she displayed at that critical moment of her life.
