SUCCESSFUL SOCIAL—The Happy Gleaner's Mission Band of the Pleasant Valley Methodist Church, held a very successful social at the Parsonage on Friday evening, April 23rd. After the opening of the Mite Boxes a short program was rendered followed by games and music. A bountiful supper was provided to which all did ample justice. THE MARKET—There was an exceptionally large market on Friday, and the town was crowded. The farmers are now busy buying seeds and will soon be ready for the season's work. A large quantity of eggs was moving, the price paid being 19c. per dozen. Potatoes sold at 30 cents per bushel wholesale. There was very little change in groceries except in regard to flour, which is still advancing. The price of black tea, it is stated, will rise, and it is announced that within a few days five cents a pound will be added to the cost. The war is the indirect cause of the change, and it is hinted that further increases may take place in the future. The two direct reasons for the increase, both arising from the European struggle, are that the present season's tea supply has been diminished by about 11,

000,000 pounds through cargoes lost on ships sent to the bottom; and that France and Russia, in their banishment of absinthe and vodka, have added millions to the world's tea drinking population. Prices of tea in Canada have not risen before because retailers were induced to lay in large stocks before the price became too active. But in the last three months the price of the commodity has risen six cents a pound, and now the consumer is to share part of the extra burden.

SUCCESSFUL MEETING—On Thursday evening Prof. Ross addressed an agricultural meeting in the new hall at Graham's Road. He spoke on the feeding of cattle, pointing out that it was not sufficient simply to give the cows all they would eat, but if they were to be fed at the greatest profit the kind of food they were fed on must be taken into consideration. Milk, he said, was a certain definite substance, containing a certain amount of protein and a certain amount of carbohydrates and a variable amount of butter fat. Before the cow could give 100 lbs. of milk she must have eaten food containing at least the amount of protein that was required in that quantity of milk. In addition to this she must also eat enough food to keep up the wear and tear of the body. Prof. Ross dealt with this subject fully, making use of charts prepared thereon. He then answered a number of questions with regard to feeding. The discussion was carried on by Messrs. James O'Connor, Cass, McLeod, Whitehead and others, at the close of which a vote of thanks was presented to Mr. Ross. In acknowledging the vote of thanks Mr. Ross brought to the atten-

tion of the meeting the Provincial Patriotic Abstinence Movement, and urged upon them to sign the pledge. Mr. Thomas Wigmore presided at the meeting, which was largely attended. Mr. Ross was invited to go back as soon as possible to Graham's Road to conduct addresses on cattle feeding.

MAY USE AEROPLANES TO LOCATE SEALS

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 5.—A novel use of the aeroplane is under consideration by owners of sealing vessels, as a result of the failure of the seal hunt this year. It is proposed that two experienced aviators be engaged to visit the east coast and the gulf of St. Lawrence, respectively, just before the opening of the next season and locate the herds. The information thus obtained would enable the fleet to sail directly for the scene of the hunt, instead of spending much time in searching for the animals.

The direct cause of the lack of success in the present season which ended May 1 was the unusually heavy amount of ice packed along the coast by continuous inshore winds. The sealing steamers, although within a few miles of large herds of seals, were unable to reach them. The total catch was less than 50,000 pelts and the loss to vessel owners from the seasons operations is estimated at about \$250,000.

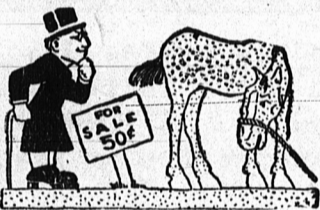
