FOURTH REGIMENT BAND

Gave a Most Meritorious Concert to a Delighted Audience at the Opera House.

The Fourth Regiment Band Phoenix like springs from its ashes and on mighty pens floats into the empyrean of song. The City may well be proud of the 4th Regiment Band and if commendation within reasonable bounds evinces that pride, the band had evidence last evening. The last concert had its lesson evidently for the conductor, for on this occasion the band was held well in hand, the attack was prompt and in the solo numbers the accompanying instruments lent themselves to the soloists. The quality of tone was highly spoken of, if this is so in a week we have an earnest of what a few months practice will do. The selection "Maritana" obtained a merited encore. The movement repeated was the ever welcome "When other lips" played with taste on the saxophone by Sergeant Rignald Stewart. The bright marches of the last program failed to arrive in time so a march had to be substituted at the last moment less taking and more difficult than its predecessors. It served to show that the Bandsmen are readers of music, where this is the case good progress is certain.

The two melo-horns (much like the French horns), add a great deal to the band, mellow in quality their tone is incisive from its intrinsic musical value, softer than the ordinary alto, its tone is much more carrying. In the duet and the concerted members they were heard to advantage. The saxophone is one of the most costly of instruments, listed at \$170, Mr Stewart astonished all by his excellent handling of the instrument at so short notice.

The clarinet solo was the only solo number which appeared on the former program. It shows the scope of the clarinets, three and one quarter octaves is most exacting on the performer. Its rendition was most creditable.

The cornet solo was a bright Polka movement, dainty and melodious. Bandmaster G. Braith has a beautiful tone to which he adds fluent execution.

The contributed numbers were capital. Messrs. Cook and Stanley are deservedly favorites alike with audiences and critics. Miss Sinclair believes the statement that Charlottetown possesses the salt of the Island earth for Summerside has some musical alkali we could make good use of. Her couple of years rest has added fullness to her extensively ranged voice. She sings intelligently and sympathetically and into the ears and hearts of her auditors.

The readings were just the things. If the tin gods (to quote Kipling) who run the mails, heard the Rev. Leo Williams reading, they will surely drink in its philosophy and get a "hump on," the people have done enough patient humming!

Miss Mackenzie won sympathy for a little "yaller dog." The plaudits of the hearers showed that the tale wagged the dog.

The conductor does not lack enthusiasm and has the happy faculty of communicating it.

The Band with commendable promptitude has got on its feet, it now behooves the citizens to hold up its hands.
