### THE ITALIAN LEAGUE MAKES DRASTIC MOVE

MILON, via Rome, March 14.—(1.20 p. m.)—The National League, at a general assembly, has passed a resolution demanding the liberation of Italianilians from Austrian domination through intervention in the European war. The League has also sent a telegram to Queen Helena, expressing admiration for "the splendid patriotic virtues of her people (Montenegrins), who are bravely fighting for the same ideal as animate the Italians."

### HUNGARIANS FEEL PINCH OF HUNGER

LONDON, March 16.—The Morning Post has the following from Budapest, Hungary: I witnessed scenes to-day at the City Hall I shall not forget for some time. The bakers and grocers were told to appear at the City Hall this morning in order to get the slips of paper which would entitle them to one or two sacks of flour from the mills. Two sacks contain 170 kilos of flour, and before the shop of every baker and grocer 500 people have been standing since early in the morning waiting for the baker or grocer to return and divide his meagre stock among them. How much one customer can get one can imagine, yet the struggle in the City Hall as well as on the streets before the bakers' and grocers' shops was one that showed how real the pinch of hunger has become. At the City Hall some 400 bakers were standing before a door on one side of the corridor, and 400 grocers on the other side, from early in the morning until late in the afternoon, as it took ten minutes to finish with each one.

At last, towards six o'clock in the evening, the shopkeepers received their slips, but by the time the last of them got to the mills, some three miles away, these were closed, and new torture and anguish awaited these shopkeepers. They dared not return home without flour, for the hungry people outside were threatening and impatient.

The price of food is so high already that everybody is of the opinion that it is impossible that the war can last longer than October, for by the time the new harvest is reaped the city population, at least in Austria-Hungary, will be on the very verge of starvation.

In regard to bread, it has now been decided that a coupon system is to be inaugurated, and it has been decided that a family of five members is to have 150 rolls and 19 loaves of bread monthly. This would mean that a growing person could have half a roll for breakfast and the same for lunch and dinner.

being larger, we are assured that a still greater advancement will be made in the efficiency of our country district schools.

The member here read the following statement:—

Expenditure for last school year, ended June 30th, 1914. Teachers salaries, \$106,000. Supplement, 18,500. Attendance Grant, 20,500. Pensions (retired teachers), 1,100. Total, \$146,100.

Paid 1911, 106,865. Increase, 39,235.

Increase in Department of Education, 3,200. \$42,435.

The call upon our young men and women trained in our schools and colleges to enter other more lucrative occupations is being met by us, and our province is retaining these sons and daughters in our schools, much to our mutual advantage. The school supply department has been a boon of untold value, and meets a long-felt need, and will continue to be appreciated more and more as a forward movement for school betterment. Every need of the school child is reduced to a minimum cost, enabling the poorest parent to provide facilities for their children's education at a nominal cost.

### AGRICULTURE.

The paragraph in the speech dealing with agriculture is most important to us, as this is the occupation on which all, or nearly all, our prosperity depends, and I am glad to note that the Department has grappled with many of the problems that enter into farm work of life. With untiring efforts it has taken up the various phases of farm work and has brought to many parts of our province a knowledge of practical things. Educational institutes are organised in many places, and these are supplied by our agricultural experts with lectures and conferences on the best methods, on every subject that interests the agriculturist. Added to this our boys have the privilege of courses of agriculture, both long and short, and many of them are taking this extended privilege, and go back to the soil with a knowledge of it that brings in its wake better conditions and improved workmanship, with about 50 per cent. of our people on the land, this department has the largest field of usefulness in which to extend its knowledge. The boy and the girl in the country school are receiving their instruction in the things they have to deal with every day on the farm, giving them thereby an interest in their studies and a home occupation. Nature becomes an open book, it is no longer a closed door to those enquiring minds. Nature studies reveals to them in the school garden the various changes and developments in plants and flowers unknown to pupils of former years, except to the fortunate few who could afford to travel from our shores to acquire this knowledge at great expense in some special institution provided for the purpose. Our Government has broken down these barriers, and has brought the knowledge to rich and poor alike.

### WOMEN'S INSTITUTES.

Another branch of this great business has entered into work of bringing more enlightenment to the mothers and daughters of our province. Its progress is marked, and although in its infancy with us, it has made rapid strides, and many of our women, young and old, are taking advantage of this best method of instruction, and many localities in our province speak of the benefits derived therefrom. Possibly no other part of the work of the Department of Agriculture shows more improvement as that shown in our Exhibition and Seed Fairs, and as well in our standing grain competition. These all show the actual results obtained from better method. The Seed Fairs are well attended, although there is no attraction to draw the people other than the products of the soil. This is as it should be. The quality of exhibits is improving every year until perfection is almost attained in many products, and the farmer who carries off the blue ribbon now does so in the face of keen competition. The Provincial Seed Fair and Exhibitions are a source of education in themselves. Here we see the best of our labours exhibited, and the farmers return to their duties with a greater desire to improve their products up to the highest standard of excellence. The increased financial aid from the Dominion Government has made this valuable field of industry equal to the best in our Dominion.

Our Government plans to place in our Province for its still greater good a laboratory fully equipped with modern appliances for the purpose of ameliorating the physical condition of both human and animal life. It is meeting the need and demand for an institution in which tuberculosis tests will be made, a place in which actual bacteriological work will be carried out, and this directed mainly in the province will be intelligently handled, and prevented from widening its scope on other victims.

### FINANCIAL WORLD.

The disturbance in the financial world caused by the war has caused a depression that has had no equal in monetary and manufacturing circles, and as a province we too have felt its effect. Our fur industry, as well as our oyster and lobster industries, have suffered much from the conditions that turned revenues, heretofore available for luxuries, into the channels of necessities. Nevertheless the increased value of farm products arising in a measure from the same cause has been a compensation for our province that offsets much of the former loss.

As a young nation, a growing tree that is fast spreading its branches over a vast territory from the Atlantic to the Pacific comprising the larger part of North America, this is destined some day to become a great nation.

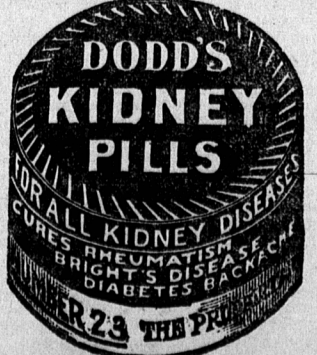
