THE GUARDIAN learns that Mr. Horace Hazard is meeting with general and hearty assurance of support in the candidature for West Queens.

The Examiner announces with regret the resignation of Mr. Hugh McInnis, who for about twenty years past has been reporter and city editor of that journal. The Examiner also bears testimony to Mr. McInnis' ability, faithfulness and reliability, in regard to which there will be only one opinion among the newspapermen of the City. We sincerely hope and trust that Mr. McInnis is not retiring from journalism, and that his resignation may not involve his removal from Charlottetown. We feel assured that his many friends include all who are engaged in active journalism in Prince Edward Island, and not a few beyond the provincial boundary.

The arrival of the first detachment of Boer prisoners at Bermuda is announced. The captives from the two Republics are now not only very numerous, but also very widely distributed. It is a far call from South Africa to Ceylon on the one hand and to Bermuda on the other. The entire group of the Bermuda Islands numbers some 300 islets and rocks, the total area of which is only 20 square miles. The population is under 16,000. The capital is Hamilton, situated on the larger of the islands. The Bermudas constitute an important military and naval station and being within 600 miles of the nearest point on the mainland of the United States, to which the prisoners would gladly escape, if they could, there is little doubt that they will be carefully guarded.

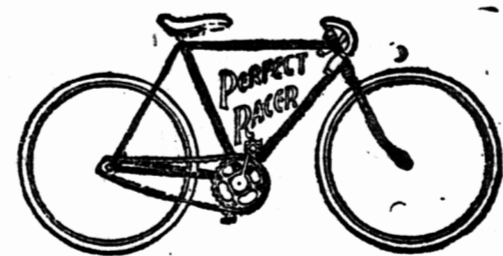
