HALLAM'S WEEKLY MARKET REPORT—HIDES, SKIN, WOOL, JUNK.

Toronto, June 2, 1915. WOOL—The Canadian Government has modified the embargo on wool, so that it is possible to secure a special permit to ship wool to the United States when it is shown that the wool is to be used only for consumption in the United States. This has widened the market for wool, and has had its effect in adjusting the prices for the present clip, so that we anticipate the usual large marketing of wool during the next few weeks. Washed combing fleeces (coarse) 25c to 27c. Washed clothing fleeces (fine) 23c to 30c. Washed rejections (burry, chafy, etc.) 23c to 24c. Unwashed fleeces combing (coarse) 18c to 20c. Unwashed fleeces clothing (fine) 23c to 25c. BEEFHIDES are steady and are being marketed freely. The quality of hides is improving as the season advances. City Butcher hides flat 14c per lb. Country hides, flat, cured, 15 1-2 to 16 1-2 per lb. Part cured, 14 1-2 to 15 1-4 per lb. CALFSKINS are easy and are coming to market in fair supply. City skins, green, flat, 15c per lb. Country cured 16c to 17c per lb. Part

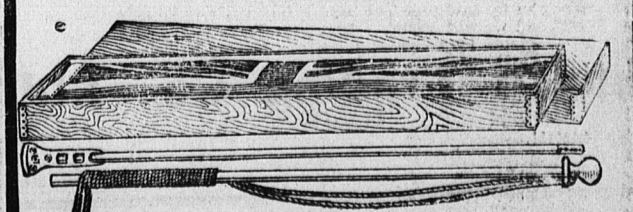
