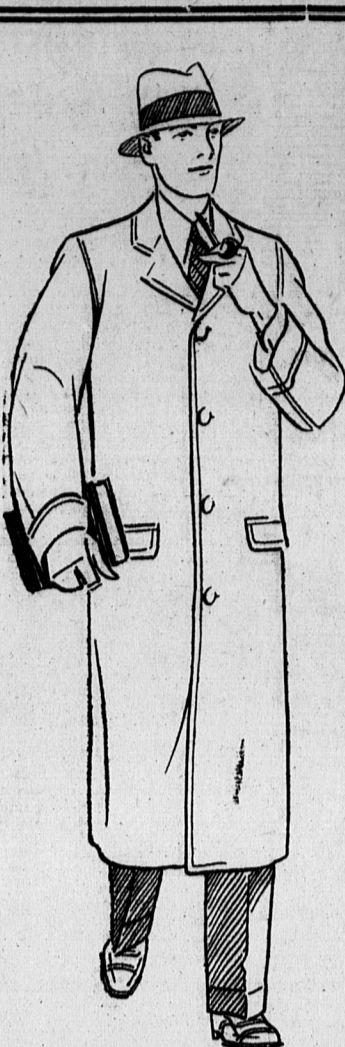

Advisory Board Resumes After Easter

(Special to the Guardian)
OTTAWA, Ont., March 29.—The Advisory Board on tariff and taxation will resume its sittings shortly after the Easter vacation. The Star learned today. The proceedings have been held in abeyance pending the completion of the budget debate and the passage of the tariff changes.

The first case to be taken up probably will be the coal appeals. The Maritime mines are asking for a higher duty on screenings coming in from the United States, but the British Columbia mines have a proposal which will create considerable heart-burning in the Maritimes and raise opposition there.

The British Columbia mine operators covet the Pacific Coast market in the United States. They point out that it is a long haul for Western coal to Eastern Canada and a long haul for Eastern American coal to Western States. "Why not reciprocity in coal?" asked the British Columbia operators. Lower the tariff and permit Eastern United States to enter Ontario so that the United States will lower the tariff and let the British Columbia coal go into the Pacific Coast States.
