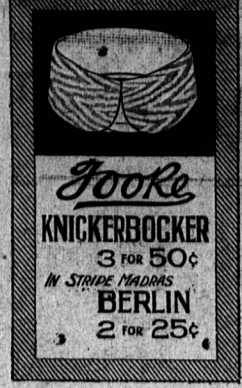

SPORTING NEWS

INTER-MARITIME RIFLE MATCH

For the twenty-ninth time, teams representing Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and comprising the pick of militia rifle-shots in those provinces, will meet to-morrow in the Inter-Maritime Rifle Match.

The match was established in 1886, and since then has been shot annually, in the three provinces alternately, and is the greatest event in Maritime rifle circles. Nova Scotia has up to this time won the Match on thirteen occasions, New Brunswick has registered eight victories, while Prince Edward Island has led on seven occasions.

This year's match, as stated, takes place on Thursday, commencing promptly at 10 a. m. The visiting teams will arrive here to-night, the Nova Scotia team by the boat from Pictou, and the New Brunswick team by the Empress from Point du Chene and then from Summerside by express to the city.

COURT OF APPEALS

(Continued from page one) and what purpose it is designed to effect.

It is laid down in Stephens-Blackstone's Commentaries (Vol. 4, p. 10) that a Writ of Prohibition is a "Writ issuing properly only out of the Court of King's Bench, being the King's prerogative writ; but for the furtherance of Justice, it may now also be had in some cases out of the Court of Chancery, Common Pleas or Exchequer; directed to the Judge and parties of a suit in any inferior Court, commanding them to cease from the prosecution thereof, upon a surmise either that the cause originally, or some collateral matter arising therein, does not belong to that jurisdiction, but to the cognizance of some other Court.

This definition of the Writ of Prohibition and of its office implies the existence of a recognized Court or tribunal having a limited jurisdiction; and it is only when such Court or tribunal exceeds the jurisdiction prescribed to it that the Writ of Prohibition becomes available for the purpose of restraining it within its proper limits. The cases relied on on behalf of the respondent, such as Veley v. Burder, 12 A. & E. 255, and Queen v. Judge of the County Court of Shropshire, 20 Q. B. D. 242, in which there was no question as to the existence of a legal tribunal, but only as to the exercise of jurisdiction, are of the class thus indicated; but it must be completely obvious that such cases bear very imperfectly upon the question, involved in the case before us. What is complained of in this case, is, not that Mr. McQuaid as Stipendiary Magistrate for Kings County had not jurisdiction over the person and offence before him, but that at the time when the person and offence were before him, he was not Stipendiary Magistrate for Kings County; in other words, it is the existence of the Court—the title of the Magistrate to his office at the time the objection was raised against him, that is really contested, which is a question absolutely distinct from that of the jurisdiction of this Court.

In the decision appealed against Mr. McQuaid is recognized as being Stipendiary Magistrate de facto when the respondent's case was before him on 10th February, 1914, and that he can be no doubt from the evidence but that he was at least clothed with that character at that time. The object of the Prohibition proceedings was to test his right to act as such Magistrate; but it is well established law—indeed it is elementary knowledge—that Prohibition will not lie for such purpose. In High's Extraordinary Legal Remedies 3rd Ed. at p. 715, it is laid down that, "The Writ of Prohibition will not lie to determine the title of a de facto judicial officer since its only function is to prevent usurpation of jurisdiction by a subordinate Court, and not to determine the title of the incumbent of a judicial office."

for the wrong and injustice that were to be done him, and that inasmuch as there must be a remedy for every wrong, therefore a Writ of Prohibition ought to be issued. But the Court said: "The fallacy consists in the assumption that relator is threatened with any wrong. Respondent being a Justice de facto, his acts are as valid as if he was a Justice de jure. In fact, as to everybody, except the State in proceedings by quo warranto to test his right to the office, he is, in effect, a Justice de jure."

Apart from this strictly legal view, it is worthy of observation as showing the wholly imaginary nature of the wrong complained of on behalf of the respondent that at the time the information was preferred and the summons thereon issued against him, Mr. McQuaid had been up and down for two years a practicing Barrister in Norton v. Shelby Co., 118 U. S. 441, the Supreme Court of the United States said: "The doctrine which gives validity to acts of officers de facto, whatever defects there may be in the legality of their appointment or election, is founded upon considerations of policy and necessity, for the protection of the public and individuals whose interests may be affected thereby. Officers are created for the benefit of the public, and private parties are not permitted to enquire into the title of persons clothed with the evidence of such officers, and in apparent possession of their powers and functions. For the good order and peace of society, their authority is to be respected and obeyed until, in some regular mode prescribed by law, their title is investigated and determined. It is manifest that endless confusion would result if in every proceeding before such officers, their title could be called in question."

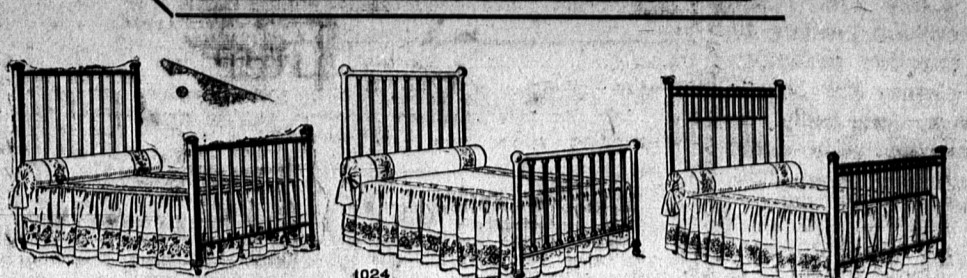

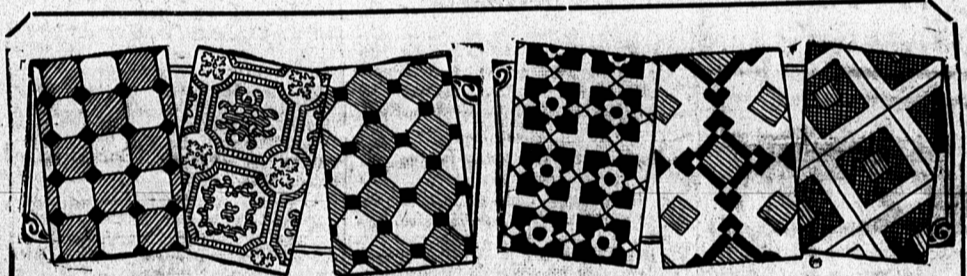
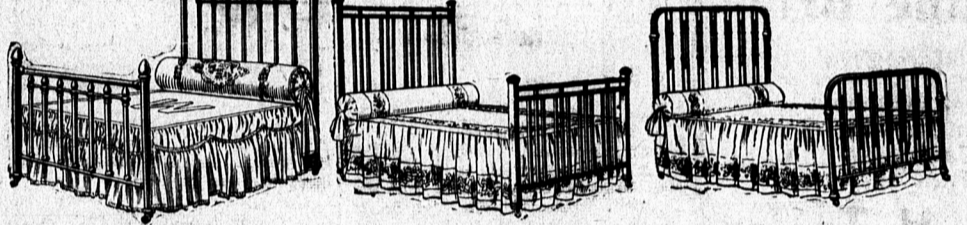
