policy as other countries have. "Agriculture must be fostered so that we can produce more. Then in order to do that we must provide additional men to meet our labor requirements. In many parts of Canada it is impossible to carry on farming unless more labor is available." The Premier said: "There should be a vigorous immigration policy to provide farm labor for Canada."

The Prime Minister emphasized the need of replanting to meet the steady depletion of the Dominion's forest wealth and urged additional exploration and development of mining resources, notably in Newfoundland and Labrador. He conceded that much had been done in recent years to encourage the fishing industry in Canadian waters.

Discusses Soil Erosion. Speaking directly of one of the problems of Prince Edward Island, the Premier said: "In our Province we have a park made up of a beach 30 miles long. The sand dunes on that beach were created by erosion of the adjoining farms. A proper policy of conservation would prevent any erosion. The condition in Prince Edward Island of which I speak was created by farmers cutting down the bush and allowing the sand to be blown in. This sand is sitting up the harbors and in turn it represents a loss to the farmers. There should be a land conservation policy inaugurated to correct this type of condition."

The Premier paid particular tribute to the work of the National Research Council in many fields. He said: "It is due to their work that disease has been practically eliminated from the potato fields of our Province and has permitted us to grow potatoes of such quality that one-half of our crops are certified seed."

Appearing for a short time at the morning session of the convention, James Lester Douglas, M.P. for Queen's, decided he could spend the time better in uptown Ottawa than listening to speeches by prominent Liberals in the convention hall. He visited several Government departments, transacted a gratifying volume of constituency business and returned to the Commons here in order to hear Prime Minister King's valedictory speech.

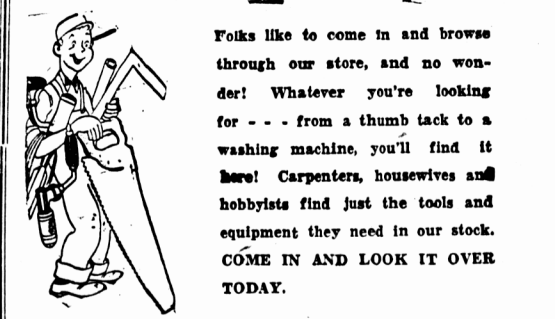

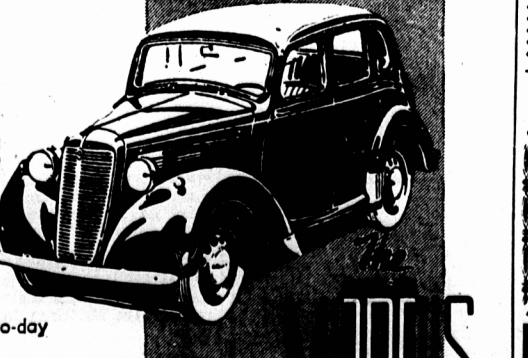
