13 In Hospital After Riots In Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 2. (AP)—Service was resumed partially on Philadelphia's subway lines tonight—the first break in a two-day transportation tie-up that has precipitated racial clashes, inconvenience and 100,000 daily riders and curtailed war production.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 2. (AP)—Gangs of armed negroes beat white men and women, smashed windows and looted stores in a night-time riot in Philadelphia today as government officials indicated impending federal seizure of Philadelphia's bus, trolley and subway lines...

Disorder died down to mid-morning after 18 persons were injured and taken to hospitals. Police said the gangs made up of teen-age youths, carrying knives, bottles, stones or bricks, and arrested 300 on charges varying from malicious mischief to aggravated assault and battery...

Police Superintendent Guy W. Parsons said police were "looking for anything to happen tonight."

Post-War Plans Have Little Effect On U. S. Steel Trade

NEW YORK, Aug. 2. (AP)—Post-war planning, while becoming more of a general topic of discussion, has had little effect on the United States steel industry so far, according to industry officials today.

"Sample orders are not materializing, and inquiries traceable to probable post-war activity have not appeared," the trade publication said. "Coincidentally with this is the extreme low point in the number of steel order cancellations, those which have appeared recently have been more than offset by new orders."

The magazine said the industry finds itself in the tightest delivery situation since the war began, and adds that virtually no steel producer was able to show a decline this week in total backlogs.

U. S. Officer Killed By Allied Bomb

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2. (AP)—The Army announced today that Lt.-Gen. Leley J. McNair was killed by the explosion of an Allied bomb which fell short in the intensive bombardment of enemy lines in preparation for the latest breakthrough in Normandy.

This report was sent to the War Department by General Eisenhower, the brief announcement said. The fact that some bombs were released over their own troops by Allied airmen was announced in the theatre by Lt.-Gen. Brenton, Tactical Air Force commander, who said that a number of casualties were inflicted by this premature release of bombs among forward elements of the American lines.

McNair, until recently in command of the army's ground forces in Normandy, was an observer. His death was announced last Thursday.
