**THE EDITOR'S MAIL.**  
Re Summerside Cape Tormentine Winter Route.

Sir,—If either the Stanley or Minto were placed upon the Summerside and Cape Tormentine route all freight for Charlottetown coming from Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick (also United States freight via St. John)—would reach Charlottetown quicker than it is possible by any other route. The balance of freight which would then come via Pictou could easily be carried by the one steamer.

Mails and passengers coming via Summerside-Cape Tormentine route would reach Charlottetown daily and in March twice daily if necessary and in day light. This arrangement would more closely approach the guarantee at time of Confederation "to keep up continued communication" than any mail, passenger or freight arrangement heretofore in operation. This disposal of our two steamers would result in giving greater accommodation to the greater number.

I cannot comprehend the meaning or purpose of the Charlottetown Board of Trade when both steamers were blocked in the ice at Pictou and not likely to be relieved for some days, appointing a committee to wait upon Sir L. H. Davies to impress the following peculiar resolution upon him as Minister of Marine and Fisheries:

"That owing to the wonderfully increased winter traffic, the service as at present established between Pictou and Georgetown by the steamers Minto and Stanley, being inadequate at times to carry the freight as fast as it offers, this Council

would strongly urge the Minister of Marine and Fisheries not to allow it to be impaired by the withdrawal of one of the steamers to experiment at any other port."

This action of the Charlottetown Board of Trade would imply that freight should take precedence over mails and passengers which is certainly not a progressive idea. Is it not a fact that the exports of farmers of Prince County and that part of Queens more closely connected with Summerside than with Georgetown constitute a large portion of freight now going forward via Pictou and if this freight was diverted to the Summerside-Cape Tormentine route it would relieve the Georgetown-Pictou route and would also relieve it of a large proportion of the incoming freight consigned to the merchants doing business nearer to Summerside than to Georgetown.

These people should not be obliged to have most of their incoming freight carried 132 miles further for Charlottetown and 182 miles further for Summerside than via the Summerside-Cape Tormentine route which is the natural route for three quarters of the people of P. E. I.

The merchants doing business in Charlottetown ought not to oppose a route which will give them a quicker conveyance for mails, passengers and freight but should commend it (I think many of them will) to the favorable consideration of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and consent to have one of the steamers put upon the Summerside-Cape Tormentine route. The terminal conditions at Cape Tormentine so far as the pier is concerned do not now count, as the board ice would be used for a landing which was recommended by both Capt. Finlayson and Capt. Brown in a report last fall to Sir L. H. Davies wherein they said "To place the Stanley at Summerside and have her all ready and let her remain there until the board ice in the vicinity of Cape Tormentine breakwater is sufficiently strong to hold the steamer, then a landing place can be made on the ice; this has been done in Souris and Georgetown on several occasions." I have no doubt that this recommendation from two of the most competent experts in connection with winter mail service would have been acted upon by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries had the small-pox epidemic been more than six miles from Cape Tormentine and in the interest of public health the steamer was withdrawn. Had the smallpox not been so near as six miles and the Stanley been permitted to carry passengers and mails she would have demonstrated beyond a question that this was the proper route to insure prompt delivery of mails and no such holding up of passengers as now exists could possibly occur. She evidently did not come here to carry freight because she had her full cargo (about 400 tons) of coal only landing about 20 tons. Notwithstanding this, enquiries for freight room began to come in from many directions. Had she been put to work in proper shape the congestion of freight complained of at Pictou would have been quickly relieved by her operations here.
