

St. Thomas Comes From Behind To Edge SDU 6-5 In Intercollegiate Series

Coming up with a powerful second period that netted them four goals to their opponents' one, Saint Thomas University came from behind a 2-1 lead to send Saint Dunstan's University down to a close 6-5 defeat at the Forum last night in a New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island intercollegiate hockey championship fixture. The game was very evenly played with only one penalty being handed out for a minor infraction which went to a visiting player.

The victory puts the Chatham pucksters into third place in the four-team series, two points behind Mount Allison University and four behind the series leading University of New Brunswick. The loss was the Saints' third in as many starts to date for a fourth-place central position in the series.

The smooth working line of McAloon, M. Barry and J. O'Neill led the bulk of the St. Thomas attack to account for four of their team's six goals. McAloon was the leading sniper with three goals and an assist. M. Barry got one goal and three assists, while J. O'Neill picked up two assists. Charet was the other goalester for St. Thomas, chalking up the remaining brace. P. Barry and Cullinan garnered an assist each.

Will Houde of Saint Dunstan's was the spark plug for his team and enticed the goal-minding honors of McAloon by chalking up three of their five goals and also picked up an assist. Mike Hennessey and Allison "Ace" Farmer were the other goalesters for Saints. Jerry McQuaid, Mike McTeague and Hennessey also picked up an assist apiece.

Saint Dunstan's took an early lead in the game when Houde banged in a long, snipe shot from the blueline on McQuaid's pass at 5:11 of the first period, but McAloon and Barry teamed up about four minutes later to deadlock the score. Farmer put the Saints one goal up again at 13:26 on a snappy passing attack from centre ice with McTeague, a lead they held for the remainder of the period. It was a fast-breaking period with both teams missing some close scoring attempts with both Strain and the visiting netminder, LaCombe, making some smart saves. Saints held the edge on the period play.

The big bust-up came in the second frame when the Saint Thomas forward section really got rolling. McAloon fired one home at 1:27 on a three-man attack with O'Neill and Barry, and although the Saints took the lead again a minute later as the result of Hennessey's goal on an attack with Houde, from there on the visitors took charge of the play. M. Barry dented the twines at 8:44, Charet at 12:22 and exactly one minute later McAloon came through with his third goal of the

night to send his team into a 5-3 lead. All three goals were on smart two and three-man passing attacks.

Saint Dunstan's cut the lead down to one goal at the fifteen second mark of the final period when Houde sank one home on an attack with DesRosters, and after weathering a series of gang attacks by the visitors, deadlocked the score at 5-5 when Hennessey and Houde teamed up on the smartest play of the night. Houde started the play at centre ice, and after the puck changed hands three times between them on the way in on net, Houde finally planted it in the net from close in.

The tie was short-lived, however, when the Chatham boys roared back just 23 seconds later to bang home the winning goal from a pressure attack around the Saints net. Charet got the tally on a pass from Cullinan.

The final five minutes of the game was a hectic tussle and although both teams worked hard to further the scoring, with Saints especially working overtime for the counter that would deadlock the score again, the Saint Thomas University boys nevertheless skated off the ice with their narrow one goal victory.
