INDUSTRIAL TRAINING AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

Canada has as yet only made a beginning in the matter of technical education. At Montreal, Toronto and in Nova Scotia something has been done. Realising the importance of such training and instruction the Dominion Government some months ago appointed a Commission of seven members under the chairmanship of Dr. J. W. Robertson, of dairying fame, to tour the world in quest of information on these subjects.

The other members of the Commission are Hon. John N. Armstrong of Nova Scotia, Rev. George Bryce, M. A., D. D., L.L.D., of Manitoba, F. R. S. C.; Gaspard De Serres, President of the Montreal Technical Schools, Gilbert M. Murray, B.A., of Toronto, Davis Forsyth, of the Berlin Technical School, B. A.; and James Simpson representative of the Dominion Trades and Labor Council.

The Industrial and Technical Education Commission has a very wide scope of travel and investigation before it. It will travel the world over, visiting nearly all the industrial countries on the face of the globe, and will endeavor to learn as much as possible of technical education in all lands. It is said that the inquiry will be the most extensive yet undertaken. Other commissions sent out for a like object have been much more limited as to the power and scope of their inquiry. For instance, the British Commission confined its visits to the British Isles and continental Europe, without visiting America.

In its progress the Commission will both receive and disseminate information, a work which the Halifax Chronicle tells has already begun. The Commissioners had an inquiry from the custom cutters of Toronto, Quebec and Brantford, asking how they could secure boys and young men to learn the tailoring business and how they could be taught. As soon as the Commission arrived in Halifax a few days ago the question was answered by Principal Sexton of the Technical College there who told of the success of the class in tailoring established last winter. Thus the western cities get valuable information from the Maritime Provinces, and the latter will doubtless in like manner be helped by information from the west, the United States and Europe in due time.

THE CRAZE FOR STIMULANTS AND DRUGS.

It is strange indeed to note the extent to which the drink and the drug habit has overspread the world. Primitive man may be supposed to have fed upon the fruits of the field and quenched his thirst from the flowing brook. Now one half the people of the world are regular tea drinkers and millions more drink coffee. This is solely for the stimulating effect and not for their value in nourishment. As for the demands of thirst, there is no known liquid which will supply it so well as pure cold water. Much has been said and sung in favor of "the cup that cheers not to inebriate," but to certain constitutions both tea and coffee are really injurious. To most persons they are harmless or beneficial. But tea drinking to thousands has become a habit almost as difficult to break off as is the pipe habit to the smoker, or the strong drink habit to the toper, without, however, the demoralising, and destructive effect which strong drink produces. There is the gulf that separates a harmless from a harmful habit.

The tobacco habit and the habit of drinking intoxicating liquors are both useless and bad but by no means equally so. The consumption of both the weed and the stimulant beverage is enormous and the cost runs into billions. Both these are injurious and needless to men in health. Both have doubtless shortened many lives, but if tobacco has slain its thousands wine and strong drink have slain their millions. Nor does the contrast end here. The pipe does not incite to quarrel or to lust, does not quench the intellect, blunt the conscience and break the will as strong drink does. No one would think of saying of a criminal that he did the deed because he was under the influence of tobacco. But man's subservency to stimulants and drugs by no means ends with the smoking pipe and the flowing bowl. Incredible as it may seem there are drugs as much more baneful than whiskey as whiskey is more

baneful than tobacco or tobacco than coffee, and these hold tens of millions of the world's people in a slavery such as has no equivalent on earth. First among these comes opium, the curse of Asia, now spreading its baneful blight over civilized and Christian lands.

It is stated on high authority that nearly one half the criminals in the United States are addicted to drugs. This is the statement of Dr. Hamilton Wright to the International Opium Conference. Opium leads the list. About 400,000 pounds of the drug are imported annually and the consumption is yearly increasing in both the United States and Canada. Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver and other Canadian cities have their opium joints as they have their taverns and brothels.

Since 1860 the population of the United States has increased 133 per cent. The consumption of opium has increased in the same period 351 per cent. If possible cocaine is a more harmful drug than opium, but the cocaine habit has also come in. About 15,000 ounces of cocaine would supply the legitimate demand in the United States. Ten times that amount is used by victims of the cocaine habit, and it is said there is no drug known which so inevitably conduces to crimes of the worst description. Thus we are living in a drug-cursed world. The young especially should be warned against the beginning of the drink habit and the drug habit, both of which lead on to a slavery that is worse than death.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's plans are to continue his meetings in the prairie provinces until August 13, when he will leave Calgary, en route to Vancouver.

Paris has enjoyed a sham fight in the air, the soaring warships "grappling in the central blue," so to speak, armed with real guns and exchanging fire. It is sad, however, to think that the thoughts of men with wings should be like those of the eagle and the hawk, bent upon cruelty and destruction. The bird man ought not to be a bird of prey.

Australia boasts an increase of revenue which almost equals that of Canada. For the first eleven months of this year the customs receipts totalled \$50,000,000, an increase of \$3,000,000 over the last full year, with a corresponding increase in the excise and post office revenues. We must not make the mistake of assuming that Canada is the only country that is going ahead these times.

A strike of the Grand Trunk Railway employees which is now imminent will probably involve as much of loss and cost as a conflagration in a city. It is not only the strikers and the company that will suffer. Transportation will be demoralised, freight and passengers delayed, the free course of much business interrupted. But the right to strike exists, along with what George Brown called "the sacred right of rebellion." The exercise of such "rights" ought to be made as infrequent as possible, however.

Nova Scotia is rejoicing in the prospect of several important progressive movements. These include the naval dock-yard at Halifax, a dry dock and ship-building plant at Sydney, to employ 500 men, and the new Halifax and Eastern Railway, to skirt the southeastern shore of the Province for 200 miles from Halifax to Guysboro. The Sydney city council has agreed to present an area of land for a site and also a bonus to an English company which is undertaking the creation of the dock and shipbuilding plant.
