Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

This sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency, or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years; cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

RESOLUTIONS AT W-W CONVENTION

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted at the Convention of Liberal-Conservatives of Queen's on Tuesday.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

The Liberal-Conservative Association of Queen's County in session assembled, hereby places on record its confidence in the Government led by Sir Robert Borden, and especially approves and commends the energy and determination with which it carries on a righteous war, the loyal and patriotic efforts it has made in behalf of the existence and security of the British Empire, and the freedom of civilization of the world ruthlessly assailed by barbarous Teutonic and Turkish hordes, and its determination by a policy of military service to stand by and help and not desert our men at the front, struggling and dying for Canada's preservation and the liberty of its people to govern themselves.

Resolved, that the Liberal-Conservative Convention of Queen's County, in session assembled, desires to place on record its high appreciation of the services of our representatives in the House of Commons, Messrs. McLean and Nicholson, in securing for the Province during the past six years so many valuable benefits, consisting in part of the new Car Ferry steamer, the great and valuable docks and harbors at Capes Traverse and Torpentine, the securing for our Province for all time to come of a minimum representation of four in the House of Commons, at a time when that representation was by reason of the great increase of population in the great industrial centres of the province of Quebec, rapidly dwindling to one, the large and splendid grants in aid of agriculture in this province, the addition for all time of 100,000 a year to our Provincial subsidy and the passage through the House of Commons of a large grant for the improvement of the public roads of the province.

Whereas, ever since this Province entered the Canadian Confederation over forty-four years ago, the transportation of passengers, mails and freight has been conducted in the winter season by an inefficient antiquated system of ice boat service at the Capes, and steamers plying between Georgetown and Pictou, and in the summer season by steamers of the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company, Limited, necessitating or

every trip two unloadings, a system which occasioned excessively high rates for both freight and passengers, many delays and often grievous hardships.

And whereas, the Laurier government, during the fifteen years of its term of office, having refused to entertain any proposal to change this effete and wasteful system, our people turned with full confidence to Sir Robert Borden, to extricate the Province from its position of inferiority in the matter of trade and commerce, as compared with the other Provinces.

And whereas, Sir Robert Borden, shortly after the formation of his government, set about obtaining the best possible expert advice for the solution of our trade difficulties and carrying to completion at the earliest possible time, whatever works and appliances were necessary for affording our people what they were promised when they entered the union. "Efficient steamer service for the conveyance of mails and passengers to be established and maintained between the Island and the mainland for the Dominion winter and summer, thus placing the Island in continuous communication with the Intercolonial Railway and the railway system of the Dominion."

And whereas, the government of Sir Robert Borden in furtherance of its determination to deal justly with the Island has constructed and completed, in the midst of a world's war that has drawn so heavily on Canadian resources, at Tormentine and Traverse at great cost two spacious and magnificent harbors fully equipped and ready for the accommodation of the powerful Car Ferry steamer, "Prince Edward Island, making it possible for the speedy transportation in summer and winter, of all commodities, at reduced costs and charges, required by our people, either to be imported or exported, thereby in a few years discarding the inefficient service that has so long weighed on the prosperity of our province.

Be it therefore resolved, that the Convention of Queen's County—Liberal-Conservatives—cordially appreciates and commends the Borden Government for the zeal, industry and tenacity of purpose with which it took hold of our transportation problem and for conferring great and lasting benefits and advantages on the Province by building the incomparable Car Ferry steamer and constructing the magnificent and spacious docks and harbors at the Capes.

Be it further resolved, that we rely with confidence that the promise given by the Borden Government that the Island Railways will be standardized is soon as possible after the ending

of the war, will be loyally and faithfully fulfilled.

Whereas, Mr. Angus A. McLean, M.P., has decided to retire from the parliamentary representation of Queen's County in the Dominion House of Commons, and whereas, he has asked to be relieved of his candidature at the ensuing general election;
