SEES EXTINCTION OF MANKIND IN 2012

COLORADO SPRINGS, Col., Sept. 11.—Statistics purporting to show that the human race is becoming gradually insane, and the prediction that the time will come when there will be no more births, were the features of an address before the American Public Health Association in Colorado Springs, recently by Dr. J. H. Kellogg, of Battle Creek, Mich.

According to Dr. Kellogg, the birth rate is decreasing in a manner that will bring it to the vanishing point in 2012. The achievements of modern science, the speaker declared, are bringing about "race degeneracy by saving the weaklings."

"To regain our lost estate," he declared, "we should get back to nature. We must cultivate health instead of disease."

EXPORTATION OF FOXES FROM ALBERTA RESTRICTED

EDMONTON, ALTA., Sept. 16.—The first session of the third Alberta Legislature opens Tuesday, and it is expected that the session will be of shorter duration than usual. Only a small number of civil bills have been advertised, and it is not expected much important public legislation will be enacted.

A libel law will probably be introduced, such a measure was slated for last year, but was shelved owing to pressure of other business. Hon. A. G. McKay will probably signal his day at the opening of the biennial conference of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

MURDERED THREE.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Sept. 15.—Charged with murdering his wife's father, mother and 16-year-old brother early today, Edward Baxter 35 years old, a telephone lineman, is being sought by the police of this city.

Baxter and his wife had been separated several months. Early this morning, it is alleged, Baxter went to the home of his wife's father, Henry Smith, where Mrs. Baxter had been staying, and opened fire on the family with a revolver. Smith, his wife and son Oscar were killed almost instantly, but Mrs. Baxter escaped, in sliding her husband and escaped from the house.

COMPULLED TO SIGN AT POINT OF REVOLVER.

JOHANNESBURG, September 15.—Sensational stories are current regarding the conference between the government officials and the mine leaders, which resulted in a settlement in the gold mine strike on the Rand, July 5 last. The labor leaders assert that General Louis Booth, ex-premier of the Union of South Africa and General Smuts, Minister of the Interior, Mines and Defence, were compelled at the point of a revolver to sign the agreement.

General Smuts has issued a denial of this. After the settlement was signed at the Carlton Hotel, according to Secretary Bain, of the Trades Federation and Secretary Matthews, of the Miner's Association, all the conference stood on the balcony of the hotel and observed soldiers with rifles leveled ready to fire at the crowd of demonstrators in the street. Two of the labor leaders again covered General Botha and General Smuts with revolvers.

"One more shot and you are dead" said one of them. The ministers thereupon commanded the soldiers not to shoot.

ELECTRICAL WORKERS GATHER IN CONVENTION.

BOSTON, Sept. 15.—Three hundred and fifty delegates from Canada, the United States and Panama Canal zone assembled in Faneuil Hall today at the opening of the biennial conference of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

The convention will continue two weeks. For the first time in the history of the brotherhood, women were seated as delegates on the floor. Only recently have women been admitted to the union.

Mayor Fitzgerald welcomed the delegates on behalf of the city. Local and national labor men of prominence also spoke. Much importance is attached to several questions which were scheduled to come before the convention, among them that of the defence fund for use in strikes, as well as legislation for the better protection of women electrical workers.

PRESIDENT CUTS SHORT VACATION.

It had been the President's intention to stay at Harlakenden House several days longer if conditions at Washington permitted, but the approaching conclusion of the conference of the tariff bill and the possibility of a vote on the currency measure in the House will compel his return.
