NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—There is no improvement in the news regarding the labor troubles this morning. The market is confronted with an excellent business picture, offset by labor troubles, unsettled conditions in Cuba, continued critical situation in Spain and the possibility of further regulations and current investigation of activity in certain stocks. In the end, good business conditions should prevail, but how much of a setback the market will have at the present time is impossible to say. A year ago, the low of the December was made on Friday December 20. December markets such as we are now having are quite the usual thing and if it were not for the labor troubles, we would be more definite about the market doing better before the

end of the year. Even on the sell-off yesterday volume was not large. Southern California Edison declared a 27 1/2 cent regular dividend and a 12 1/2 cent special dividend. We would look on first thing this morning and be governed by the manner in which the market takes additional selling.

London Theatre Plays Are Good Profits Scarce

By THOMAS T. CHAMPION Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, Dec. 19.—While the London theatre goes by the quality of fare in 1936 as satisfactory there is evidence theatre proprietors and managers are finding the business hard-going financially.

Enormous rentals and "bloated" salaries of stars render ventures into theatrical production in the metropolis more hazardous than ever. It has been said there are not more than three London managers who have made money out of the theatre in the last few years.

Among works of a general social character "Whiteoaks" by Mazo de la Roche, the Canadian writer, did so well at the Little Theatre that it has now moved to the Playhouse, and is well towards its 300th performance. Ivor Novello's musical play "Careless Rapture" has filled Drury Lane from its first presentation in September, and the question of a Christmas pantomime at this famous house was ruled out almost from the start.

"Lady Precious Stream" the delicate little work on Chinese life by a Chinese author, has again gone into the bill of the Little Theatre after a very short absence. "Mademoiselle" adapted by Miss Audrey and Miss Weaveney Carton from Jacques Deval is pursuing its brilliantly gloomy way at Wyndham's.

Britain's two greatest playwrights, Barrie and Bernard Shaw, made their offerings almost at the close of the year. Barrie's "The Boy David," had its initial run at Edinburgh, with every phase of Scotch life attending. It was the greatest first-night in Scotland since Home's "Douglas" was produced in the 18th century. A number of Scottish papers even produced poems in honor of the event.

"The Boy David," which is now to be transferred to London, is the only work Barrie has written for the stage for 16 years. The story—if it can be so called—is concerned with the son of Jesse who became King of Israel.

"Barrie has brought himself almost back to the mood, in which he wrote 'Peter Pan,'" said the Daily Telegraph. "David is a boy in this play, but we know that he did grow up, and that he realized all his boyish dreams. Not only did he kill the giant, but he became a King and made a people. His achievement was carried through despite Saul, and Barrie could not be Barrie, if he had not seen in their relations the conflict between

A BY-LAW TO AMEND A BY-LAW RESPECTING MEAT, FISH AND OTHER PRODUCTS. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows: Section 1 of the By-law respecting Meat, Fish and Food Products is hereby struck out, and the following substituted in lieu thereof: 1. No person shall sell or keep or offer for sale or barter at retail in the City of Charlottetown any uncooked meats or fresh fish or poultry, except in the public portion of the Market Building and Square, and therein on market days only (which exception shall in the case of meat or poultry extend only to that upon which market toll shall be paid) unless he shall have a license so to do, which shall be issued by the City Clerk on application of the licensee and certificate of the Food Inspector for said City that he has examined the premises and equipment intended to be used by the applicant therefor, and approves thereof. Such license shall expire on the 31st day of December following the date of issue or last renewal and shall be renewable unless objected to by the Food Inspector within thirty days thereafter.
