## Blow Restores Memory Which Went in 1919

OTTAWA, Feb. 4.—Losing all memory of his Canadian home and associations when beaten and robbed on the streets of Bordeaux, France, in April, 1919, Company Quartermaster Sergeant William Ball of the Canadian Forestry Corps did not regain knowledge of his home and family until he had found himself a member of the Spanish Foreign Legion, in a jail in Refa, Morocco. Sergeant Ball declares that he was struck over the head with a rifle butt wielded by a Spanish officer. He is now in Ottawa to report to the Dominion headquarters of the Great War Veterans' Association, which has been conducting a search on behalf of his wife for the past two and a half years. At the time of his disappearance Ball was engaged in showing moving pictures to the troops on behalf of the Y. M. C. A. After his disappearance he was declared a deserter. His home is in Port Hope, Ontario.

## Relates His Experiences.

To G. W. V. A. officials today Ball stated that his last memory was as far as his previous life was concerned, was walking along the streets of Bordeaux on the night of April 18th 1919. Subsequently he discovered that he had been picked up by French soldiers and taken to hospital where the back of his head was found to be fractured. Leaving this institution Ball was told by a waiter in one of the restaurants that according to his story his applications to the American and British authorities were not fruitful. Subsequently Ball says that he shipped as a member of the crew of a vessel trading to German ports and that he lost his ship in Hamburg, Germany, owing to the intervention of revolutionists. I served in this revolution on the government side Ball said, but managed to reach the United States in July 1920. Just what happened during the following months Ball does not seem to have a clear idea, but he says that in New Orleans he interviewed the Spanish consul and was placed in charge of the recruiting for the Spanish legion, and subsequently sailing for Spain and Morocco on the steamship Cadiz.

## Life in Foreign Legion.

Sergeant Ball gives fresh evidence of the adverse conditions under which the Foreign Legion was quartered at a place named Refa, he states, and there was absolutely no attempt on the part of the authorities to establish anything like proper sanitary conditions. The equipment was a joke and we were given no training in the use of arms. Ball added that

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declares that the methods of the Spanish officers were brutal in the extreme and that members of the legion were tied up until their flesh turned black from the stoppage of circulation. The man he adds, was struck across the face with a rawhide whip for the most minor offence and that a favorite punishment was lashing a 60 lb. sack of rocks on a man's back with hay wire.

"We were told when we joined that we would fight in the cause of Christianity," he said "and that we would receive four and a half pesetas a day. This sum afterwards dwindled to one peseta a day and the men were told that the difference went to pay for the clothes, food and equipment. They were also promised a bonus of 700 pesetas, part of which they received, he says.  
"My return to a normal state was brought about when I interfered in the punishment of one of my comrades," Ball says. "This man had been tied up, and I caught him down without authority. Afterwards an officer threatened me with a rifle and I hit him over the head with a revolver butt. This officer then hit me and when I woke up in jail I remembered my home and family."

## Sentenced to Death.
