FIRST WOMAN ALDERMAN IN BRITISH EMPIRE

"I always look on the city," says Mrs. Gale Alderman on Calgary City Council, "as a large home. The council is the parent each different class a child and the welfare of each class is equally dear."

Whenever Alberta women have that oft-repeated adage hurled at them that, "Women's place is in the home," and when public women are flouted as "Home neglectors," they point with pride to the case of Alderman Annie Gale, of Calgary the first woman alderman in the British Empire. Alderman Annie Gale is just beginning her fifth term on the Calgary City Council, taking a higher place than in her previous elections.

Contrary to the home neglect and public success idea Mrs. Gale is an excellent housekeeper and home maker. Her multitudinous civic duties are woven in to the management of a home, the care of a husband, and two boys of the teen age. She does her own work specialized on good meals for this healthy family, keeps her home attractive and sees to it that the boys have everything that makes life happy.

The special departments of civic work in which Mrs. Gale is interested this year are the co-ordination of health activities committee, the reception and publicity committee of which she has been a member ever but were unable to do any damage before the bell rang, and the period ended with a score of 3-0 for Bedeque Mr. James Clark referred the game to the entire satisfaction of all.

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Mrs. Gale was born in England and settled in Calgary in 1912; her first communal or public service was rendered as secretary of the Consumer's League. This society did a remarkable work by making the city market—which was a "White Elephant" to the city—a paying public utility. This was done by creating a popular feeling in marketing—among the women—thus bringing the producer and the consumer in direct contact and eliminating the middleman.

Then in order to overcome the apathy of women in regard to their civic responsibilities the Women's Ratepayers Association of Calgary—the first organization of its kind in Calgary, was found with Mrs. Gale as president. The annals of their society record "That the honor is due to her for having nominated the first woman for a city council in the British Empire—its president Mrs. Gale, a woman progressive, intelligent, with absolute honesty of purpose.

"There is no reason," concluded Mrs. Gale, "why a woman of average intelligence should not make a successful administrator of the city's affairs. The time has come when the necessity for

investigations are being made on the Back River, with a view to developing from 45,000 to 50,000 horse power. It is understood that the interests in question have under consideration the development of an industrial area in the Back River district, its intention being to bring in industries which will use the power thus developed.
