

HA WKS WIN THIRL STRAIGHT FROM WOLVES

REDMEN WIN FINAL GAME FROM CANADIENS

Crowd Of 13,000 See McGill Team Win Senior Title

Third Period Attack Gives Big Red Team Three Goals For 4-1 Victory.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 12—Hockey fever rose to its season's peak here tonight as a rabid crowd of more than 13,000 pushed its way into the Forum to see McGill University's great team take the senior championship of the Province of Quebec for the first time since 1931.

McGill, rising to the heights in the third period, defeated Canadiens 4-1 in the third game of a two-out-of-three series. Canadiens won the first match last Wednesday, 4-2 but were defeated and shut out in the second game, on Friday, 1-0.

The Redmen will meet Quebec Aces, provincial intermediate title-holders here Wednesday night in the first of a two-game total goals series for the provincial championship, the winner to be host to the Maritime representatives here in Allan Cup eliminations.
