P. S. S. PUPILS ADDRESSED—Mr. Fred Nash gave the third of his series of patriotic lectures to the senior pupils of Prince Street School yesterday afternoon. The subject was Prince Edward Island and the learned lecturer inspired his youthful hearers with some of his own enthusiasm as he cited many incidents, humorous and otherwise, in connection with our island's history. His stories of discovery, change of ownership, pioneer life, government, education, development of resources and famous men and women were listened to by the pupils with the closest attention. A vote of thanks was moved by Miriam Cox, seconded by Nancy Weeks, and supported by Marie Mutch, Mabel Matheson, Mr. L. H. Shaw, and Mrs. R. H. Rogers. Principal Rogers expressed his deep appreciation of the lectures prepared and given by Mr. Nash, who has always proved himself a friend of the students.

HOHELAGA COMING—On the 10th of the month, owing to the activities of the steamer Hochelaga in charge of Captain Hubert Coffin, the southern coast of Nova Scotia, particularly from Cape Sable to Canis, is similarly free from the remaining craft, is the statement that the Hochelaga has been withdrawn from the service, the reason given being that she is costing "too much money" says the Halifax Herald. The owners of the steamship have been drawing \$6,000 a month. The steamer has only been in the customs service for a few weeks. She is now in port and it is stated is under orders to remain here until further notice. In the meantime the Grib, in charge of Captain Russell Coffin, will endeavor to carry on. It is further stated the Hochelaga is to resume her sailings on the Pictou-Charlottetown route on May 15. This will be good news for both the patrons of that popular route and the people engaged in the lucrative pastime of beating the customs also. The Halifax Herald endeavored to get in touch with John Simon, the managing owner of the Hochelaga, last night, but that gentleman was out of town. With the announcement that the Hochelaga has been withdrawn from the preventative service, it is expected active operations will be resumed all along the coast. As it was known the Hochelaga was doing splendid work in the customs service, there is much speculation as to her early withdrawal. Advice from Pictou as to the effect that the board of trade of that town demanded her return in accordance with the terms of her contract to carry the mails to and from Prince Edward Island. But it is known the owners were negotiating for another steamer for the Pictou-Charlottetown route and were expecting to put the new boat on that route within a fortnight.

Forced to leave the child on the floor, because the flames had caught her clothing, Miss Ford rushed for a pail of water and drenched the little child. A physician was hurriedly summoned but the child died about six o'clock having received Miss Ford was burned about the hands while her clothing too, was scorched.
