FIRE DESTROYS BARN AT DUNDAS

On Friday night last the people of Dundas were startled with a fire in the neighborhood which destroyed the barn belonging to Dr. Morris. About 11.30 the barn was found to be in flames. The doctor had 12 tons of hay and 3 tons of straw besides his carriages and some farming implements stored therein.

The origin of the fire is unexplained as the building was apart from other buildings. Still as it is a place often passed by people coming to and returning from the village on foot the theory, and it seems the only plausible one, is that someone going either way must have entered the open shed and lit his pipe unguardedly. Throwing down his lighted match it came in contact with the inflammable material all around resulting in the fire.

Much sympathy is felt for the doctor, who was at the time returning from the city, and for the family who were so suddenly disturbed in their sleep by the neighbors who came to tell them of the danger.

The loss is estimated at between \$500 and \$600, partly covered by insurance.

BRAKEMAN WAS FATALLY INJURED

LAURENCE, MASS., Jan. 10.—W. T. Campbell, a young brakeman on the B. & N. Y. road, and belonging to Somerville, was knocked senseless Wednesday shortly after 7 o'clock. Campbell was on the top of a freight car bound for Haverhill, and was struck by the bridge, and received a very bad fracture of the skull, from which he died in a hospital in this city late this afternoon.
