**Boys' Heifer Club Organized**

There was an enthusiastic meeting of boys, their parents, and breeders held at the Agricultural Hall on Tuesday, March 17th for the purpose of organizing a Boys' Heifer Club. C. A. Archibald, Federal Live Stock Promoter, and W. R. Shaw, Provincial Live Stock Superintendent were in attendance, and after the details of the policy governing such organizations were explained, it was decided to organize a club.

The following officers were elected: Clifford Proud, Hampshire, President; Parker Wood, Southport, Secretary; Edmund Robertson, Mt. Albion, Vice-President.

Advisory Board—Charles McKenzie, Milton; Cecil Stewart, Hampshire; Edmund Robertson, Mt. Albion.

After the boys had been officially elected they took charge of the meeting, and transacted their business in a very commendable manner.

It was decided that the club should be known as the Abegweit Boys Heifer Club. Arrangements

were made for the selection and purchase of the heifers. The latter are to be two year olds, freshening in the fall of 1925. After a full discussion on details dealing with the carrying on of the club, the annual dues were collected and the meeting adjourned.

This club is modelled along the same lines as the Pioneer Boys' Heifer Club, which has performed such excellent work since its organization and is one of a number that are under process of organization in the Province.

W. MacLeod today by Hon. E. H. Armstrong. Otherwise there were no new developments in colliery situation.

He hoped that the government would look to the upkeep of the country roads. After all the most economical method of keeping the roads in good condition is, he said, the use of the log drag. Road masters should be urged to keep the roads in good repair.

The Fox industry was initiated in the first district of Prince County and the export of live lobsters was also begun there. These were calculated to add to the wealth of the Province. He closed a good, practical speech by expressing his appreciation of the honor accorded him in being permitted to move the Address.

Mr. Hunter seconded the motion. It is gratifying, he said, to realize that sure and steady progress is being made toward normal conditions. One of the chief obstacles to progress is high taxation. Economy should be the watchword of all governments. It is evident to every thoughtful man that no country can go on indefinitely adding to its public debt. We are thankful for the bountiful harvest of last year. The price of farm produce was, it is true lower than in the previous years; but there were compensations in larger crops. Men are now forgetting party interests, are banding together in an effort to obtain justice for the Maritime Provinces. A way must be found to check the exodus of farmers to the United States. We should encourage the establishment of local industries. We have here the raw materials out of which many of the requirements of the people are made, and these raw materials may well be manufactured here. On behalf of the farmers of the Province, he said, the governments co-operation with them in the improvement of farming conditions is to be commended. The soil of this island is particularly good for potato growing, and despite the high duty against them many bushels of seed potatoes have been sold in the United States. It is folly to place all our eggs in one basket. We should maintain and improve a course of mixed farming.

He commended highly the work of the Public Works Department in the improvement of the highways of the country. It is also pleasing to learn that a system of road maintenance is being inaugurated and that an improved system of public accounts has been introduced. In all lines, he concluded, progress has been made in the past year.

Mr. Saunders, Leader of the Opposition expressed great regret on account of the death of Senators Yeo and Murphy. Senator Yeo was a quiet, unassuming man, but when he said anything on behalf of the country his words had a good effect. Senator Murphy was a man of exceptional ability. The Province has lost much by the death of these two gentlemen. He expressed the belief, resulting from his travels abroad that there is no spot on the top of this green earth in which the people are upon the whole happier or more comfortable than in the Maritimes. There is no Province in which the farmers are more hospitable and in which the people have greater abundance of the good things of life. A great many of the people have a nice little banking balance.

He contended that under the present government, the patrol system good work was done in Kings County, and in other parts of the Province. The government has made a beginning towards the upkeep of the roads. The present government proposed, he said, to continue experimentation as to the best method of highway maintenance. The roads built by the government were at least equal as well built as those built by the late government. It is the intention of the Government, he said, to have the roads repaired as early as possible in the spring.

The Fox Experiment Station would, he said, be established for the benefit of the whole Province. The Leader of the Government explained the conditions in which the Fox Experimental Station is to be established. As to the bonds issued, the proceeds had been applied to the reduction of the debt by the late Government and would be used for the improvement of highways. The bonds had been sold at a satisfactory figure. The improvement of the Audit of Provincial accounts had the concurrence of the Provincial Auditor. Under the new system the Government and Legislature can tell, at any time just where the Province stands financially. The Government told the people that it would repeal the poll tax; and we did repeal it at the first opportunity. But in fairness and justice to those who had paid poll tax it was necessary to collect the poll tax levied before the law was repealed. He contended that the enforcement of the prohibition law had been administered as thoroughly and satisfactorily as ever before. The Government could not, he pointed out, prevent the physician from supplying to their patients any quantity of alcohol which they supposed to be necessary. In conclusion the Premier said that the government was in duty bound to administer the affairs of the Province, not in the interests of the Party in power but in the interests of the Province at large.

Mr. McArthur said he sincerely concurred in the compliments which had been paid by the mover and seconder of the Address, and in the praise bestowed upon His Honor the Lieutenant Governor for his efforts to maintain the dignity of his office and the Legislature. He also referred to the virtues of the deceased Senators Yeo and Murphy. He reviewed the Speech from the Throne and the conditions that prevailed in Europe as well as in the neighboring provinces. He said that he knew that there was great hardship throughout this province and agreed with the Premier that the Government is paying too much per scholar for the instruction of the pupils in our schools. He went on to criticize the Government's administration of the highways, to contend that the proposed Fox Experimental Station should be established at Summerside, and to criticize the financial management of the government and its policy respecting education.

Hon. Mr. MacDonald, Commissioner of Public Works referred first of all to the deceased Senators and to the speeches of the mover and seconder of the Address. He moved the adjournment of the debate and the House adjourned until ten o'clock tomorrow.

At the beginning of yesterday's sitting a bill entitled "The Voluntary Winding Up Act" was, on motion of Hon. J. D. Stewart, received and read the first time.

Mr. McEwen presented a petition from John W. Sanderson and others praying for "An Act to incorporate the Grandview and Cable Head Rural Telephone Company, Limited."

A bill in accordance therewith was introduced and read a first time.

**Little Hope Held For Entombed Miners**

 FAIRMONT, W. Va., March 18.—R. M. Lambie, Chief Mine Inspector of West Virginia declared in a statement issued shortly after noon today that rescue workers would not be able to reach the 34 entombed miners in mine 41 of the Bethlehem Mine Corporation before late tonight. The belief was expressed earlier in the day that they might be reached during the afternoon. There is no indication as to whether any of the miners survived the blast which wrecked the mine last night. Rescue crews, however, held out little hope that any of them will be taken out alive.

No. 1 Northern closed at \$1.63 7-8. No. 2 Northern at \$1.57 7-8 and No. 3 Northern at \$1.53 3-8 per bushel, ex-store, Fort William. The premium on No. 1 Northern advanced 1-2 cents per bushel to the May option price, but the other contract grades were unchanged. There was some demand from exporters for Canadian western oats in the local market. A stronger feeling prevailed in the market for rear lots and prices were marked up one cent per bushel, with No. 2 Canadian Western quoted at 67 cents, No. 3 C. W. at 59 cents, No. 1 feed at 56 cents and No. 2 feed at 52 cents per bushel, ex-store. There were no developments in the local market for spring wheat grades of flour, except that the tone was steadier in sympathy with the recovery of 7-8 cents to 7-8 cents per bushel in prices for cash wheat at Winnipeg. Prices were unchanged, with carloads of first patents quoted at \$9.80, second patents at \$9.30, and strong bakers at \$9.10 per barrel in jute bags ex truck.
