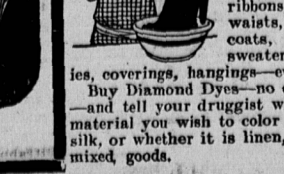

When stitching skirt seams always have the selvedge side uppermost to keep the material from becoming puckered. When two crossing seams have to be joined, tack a narrow piece of tape in the seam before stitching. This will prevent the seam from stretching.
