



WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

The promoters of the Pan-American Exposition which is to be open in Buffalo next month are apparently leaving nothing undone which enterprise and a lavish expenditure of money can effect to make it one of the completest and most attractive in the history of such undertakings. The latest fruits of human discovery and invention as applied to the world's arts and industries will find exemplification. Among the most wonderful appliances which visitors to Buffalo will have an opportunity of inspecting for the first time will be the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy. This branch of that wonderful art by which the most distant nation have been brought into immediate communication with each other is still in its infancy and experts in the art of telegraphy hardly care to pronounce upon its future. The most sanguine, however anticipate that by its means men will ere long be able to exchange their thoughts across the ocean, without cable or other visible means of communication. Nikola Tesla is said to be now at work upon the problem of transatlantic wireless telegraphy. The practicability of the wireless system for communication between places hundreds of miles apart has already been demonstrated. Mr. Marconi has succeeded in establishing wireless communication between the Lizard on the coast of Cornwall, England, and St. Catherine's, 200 miles distant, and arranged to duplex the line so that he could send two messages each way at the same time.

A BOSTON correspondent says: A sad accident occurred at Haverhill Thursday morning, when John Creighton, a lineman employed by the New England Telephone Company, fell from a pole and was killed. Creighton was 33 years of age, and came from Summerside, P. E. I. He was unmarried and lived with his brother George, in the Bradford district of Haverhill.

MURDERED HIS FIVE BABES.

CHARTRES, Department of Eure, Et Loir, France, April 23.—Suspicion in the brutal murder of five children, aged respectively 14, 11, 7, 5 and 4 years, which occurred yesterday at a farm, now falls upon the father of the murdered children. It is suggested that the father murdered the children in a fit of drunken madness, as he spent the evening in drinking, and no trace of the alleged tramps has been found. While the children were killed with a hammer or bludgeon, their father was only stabbed, and his wounds were slight.

IRISH SOLDIERS MUTINY.

LONDON April 23.—Two hundred of the Royal Munster Fusiliers refused to parade at Carlisle fort in Cork last Monday as a mark of their disapproval for being transferred from Spike Island to Carlisle fort; As a precautionary measure the officers of this battalion locked up the men's arms and notified the military headquarters at Spike Island of the occurrence. It is understood that the soldiers from another battalion will be sent to Carlisle fort to bring the insubordinate fusiliers under control.

The Empress saw an account of the plot and immediately warned the Emperor, who joked about the matter, thus removing her disquiet.

QUEER MUDDLE FROM NEW DIVORCE RULING.

NEW YORK, April 22.—Henry Frederick Mouquin, a prominent restaurant proprietor here, has been granted an annulment of his marriage to Jennie Loupe Mouquin on the ground that the Dakota divorce she obtained eight years ago to marry him was invalid. This places the woman in the position of still being the wife of William C. Ami, whom she apparently divorced in 1893. To make matters worse Ami is said to have married again. He is now a resident of Winnipeg.

The woman was once the governess in the family of Lord Stanley, ex-Governor General of Canada.

CAUGHT IN DEATH TRAP.

CAPE TOWN, April 22.—Colonel Crabbe according to a Reuter's special telegram from Colesberg, drove a Commando of Boers right up to the Orange. A hundred of them managed to escape to the mountains, but a small number tried to cross the river, where their horses stuck in the muddy banks and their riders were washed down the river, most of them being drowned. Colonel Crabbe did not allow his men to fire on them.

NEW GERMAN TARIFF.

LONDON, April 23.—A despatch received here from Berlin says that the scale of custom duties which it is proposed shall govern future commercial treaties is as follows:

Wheat, rye and oats, 5 1-2 marks per one hundred kilograms; maize 2 1-2 barley mal 5 1-2 other malt 8; steers cows and calves 5 marks per 100 kilos, live weight; oxen 9 sheep 5; hogs 8.

A DARING DEED.

One man in New York did for his dinner: Tuesday what most men would do for all the wealth of Lord Stratheona. He was at work painting an arch on the new East River bridge 300 feet above the water. One of the steel cables being stretched across the river passed within his reach. When the noon whistles sounded he grasped the cable, let himself out of the sling, and, winding his legs about it, he shot toward the ground. The crowd below held its breath. They were not accustomed to such daring. But the painter was unconcerned. He came sliding to the ground, regulating his speed nicely by pressing his knees together, and alighting on the foundation piers, dashed away for his dinner.
